## Karen Clark

Karen Clark – globetrotter, boater, adventurer, lawyer, wife, mother, grandmother and author – is a truly dedicated library supporter. She has served on the Board of Library Trustees and currently serves on the Library Foundation Board. A native Californian, Karen graduated with a BA in history from Stanford, where she met her husband, Bruce, who was studying for his Ph.D. in geology, after having graduated from Yale. Karen later earned a Masters in Modern European History from University of Washington, with plans to become a community college teacher.

Bruce accepted an academic position at University of Michigan, much to Karen's dismay as a Californian, not to mention the nearly impossible career in teaching history at the community college level in a small, highly educated academic community. She enrolled at Michigan Law School and was able to convince Bruce to return to California where law firms were hiring, even though that meant giving up his tenured academic position.

Karen joined Gibson, Dunn & Crutcher LLP, an international firm even in the 70s, in the corporation/real estate/financing field, where she retired as a partner in 2003.

That same year the Clarks bought Avanti, a 39' trawler in Mallorca, Spain, and spent a good portion of the next eight years cruising from port to port throughout the Mediterranean – from Spain to North Cyprus – with their small black dog, Roka. Karen's book about their adventure,

Mediterranean Summers: How a Man, a Woman, and a Dog Spent Eight Years Exploring the Ancient Sea in the Small Boat, was published in February.

#### 1. All-time favorite book?

I think that the book I loved most at the time I read it is Wallace Stegner's Angle of Repose, a book I first read in my 20s.

#### 2. What's on your nightstand?

We built a Little Free Library in our front yard and books are always going in and out. I find so many that others put there to be interesting, so I pull them out to read and usually have a dozen or so waiting in the wings. I'm in three book groups and now I am reading *The Spider's House* by Paul Bowles, a historical novel written in 1955 about the early 50s nationalist uprising in Morocco against French rule, to prepare for our trip to Morocco in September. Also by my bed is Billy Collins' book of fun, charming poems, *Aimless Love*. He can always cheer me up.

#### 3. Favorite place to read?

In one of our two overstuffed black leather chairs in the living room in front of the fireplace. The chairs are wonderful for reading, sleeping and ocean-gazing.

#### 4. Print or e-book?

Print. I read e-books now and then and enjoy them, but still gravitate to print.

#### 5. Where do you get your news?

Los Angeles Times, Daily Pilot, New York Times, Internet

#### 6. Your heroes?

I'm a cynic about calling people heroes. There are many people I greatly admire though, including those living such as Malala Yousafzai and Jimmy Carter. My favorite historical figure would have to be Catherine the Great.

#### 7. Favorite place in the world?

After spending a good portion of eight years on our boat in the Mediterranean, I'd likely pick almost any Mediterranean port. On second thought, some of those ports actually aren't all that great. So I'd narrow it down to either the endlessly fascinating Barcelona, or a group of picturesque small towns and inlets along the south coast of Turkey between Fethiye and Antalya.

## 8. Favorite place in Orange County?

My home in Corona del Mar.

## 9. Your thoughts on the most important offerings of libraries today?

Libraries, and especially our library, has so many cutting-edge innovations. Good old paper-bound books will always be most important, but our databases, media lab and computer facilities are terrific.

## 10. What do you see as the library of the future?

Even ten years ago, few could visualize the type of libraries that currently exist. I think the library of the future will be full of wonders that will surprise and amaze us, things we can't even imagine now.


