Recent Speakers in Review



Hunter Drohojowska-Philp is a Los Angeles-based art critic and journalist, who writes about art, design and architecture. She spoke about her recent book. Rebels in Paradise: The Los Angeles Art Scene and the 1960s. It is the extraordinary story of the artists who propelled themselves to international fame during the 1960s

Drohojowska-Philp made it clear that she loves to write about art but she also loves to write about artists. A great storyteller with an encyclopedic body of anecdotes about artists and gallery owners. she shed light on an era that is not

necessarily well known in Southern California. Her book is clearly a love letter to L.A. and the artists that populated it at the timenames like Ed Ruscha, Robert Irwin, David Hockney, Andy Warhol and Irving Blum of the Ferus Gallery, who gave Warhol his first show.

in Los Angeles.

Drohojowska-Philp told a great story about Irving Blum who took Warhol on and bought a serial work of three of Warhol's Campbell's Soup Can paintings for \$1,000. Much later. Blum sold the set to the Museum of Modern Art for \$15 million. A single painting today is valued at \$15 million.

The talk was enriched by many images of paintings and painters. Particularly striking were images of baby-faced Andy Warhol, Billy Al Bengston and Dennis Hopper.



Greg Gorman has taken photos of the world's most interesting people for more than 40 years and he is considered a premier figure in modern photography. If representing the human form is an art, then Gorman is certainly a master.

He spent the night talking over hundreds of his iconic images spanning his entire career. It was clear that Gorman has a relationship with most of his subjects, as he had a personal story about nearly every face that came on the screen.

It was those revelatory moments that made the

images truly come to life. One example was of a photograph of Sophia Loren. Gorman explained, "Sophia was always one of my heroes. From when I was a little kid, the three people I always wanted to photograph were Sophia Loren, Brigitte Bardot and Gina Lollobrigida, I shot Sophia in Rome for Detour magazine. She drove herself to the shoot. Did her own makeup and hair. She said to me one point at lunch, 'You know Greg, I'm really not 60, I'm three times 20.10

Gorman clearly cares about his models and his intent. He lets his subjects in on the mystique of the craft and thus earns a deeper respect. He said, "My subjects can't see what I'm doing because they're on the other side of the camera. That's why it's so important to bring them around and show them what I'm doing."



Alexandra Fuller is the author of four award-winning non-fiction books

As a child. Fuller moved from England with her family to a farm in Rhodesia where she experienced that country's civil

Fuller spoke generously of her experience of war--- 'we had a farm with a beautiful view if you discounted that it was three feet from a minefield"and she spoke about her remarkable relationship with her larger than life mother. "She drank a lot but could still

handle a machine oun with ease."

Fuller also spoke passionately about having become an American citizen and how grateful she was to move from a country where freedom of speech was not often tolerated, to one that embraced it in its constitution. Speaking as an outsider looking in, she cautioned the audience that there is a lot of saber rattling of late in the U.S. "I am a pacifist in part because I've been through a war. My childhood was so full of violence that you just stopped commenting on it."

Settling in Wyoming, Fuller began writing about the degradation of the land and the people by the oil industry which culminated in her latest book, The Legend of Colton H. Bryant,





Ken Auletta has been on the front lines of the new communication revolution since 1992 writing for the New Yorker magazine.

Auletta spoke with authority about the future of media and how fast our world is changing. He recounted an interview with Bill Gates in the 1990s in which he asked Gates what he was worried about in the near future for Microsoft. Gates said what he really worried about was that somewhere in a garage, some guy was inventing something that no one has ever heard about. Sure enough, in Menlo

Park, Larry Page and Sergey Brin were inventing Google

Google, along with Facebook, Apple and others have changed the world as we know it, and Auletta talked at length about the pros and cons of our fast-paced digital world. He feels the digital world has greatly enhanced our news world and does not see it as a menace but as something that can widen our worldview

Auletta cautioned that Google, with its virtual library at our fingertips, is trying to replace librarians but reminds us that actual librarians can answer your questions in a personal way, avoiding the flood of results in a Google search. He used The New York Times as an example of the disparity in media formats. The average reader spends 34 minutes a day with the paper version. The online reader spends only 35 minutes a month!

Someone You Should Know

Leslie Feibleman

We cornered creative dynamo Leslie Feibleman for a few minutes to catch up for some library chat.

How did you first get involved with the library and what is your level of participation now?

In 1988, I moved to Corona del Mar from the Bay Area and quickly became an active patron and proud supporter of the library. In 2004, I joined the Manuscripts Committee, a group of dynamic and intelligent women who shared a passion for books and culture. We planned author lectures and other exciting book events. During the next few years, I organized the Newport Beach Film Festival's free filmmaking seminars at the library. In May of this year, I arranged a screening of the documentary Stories from an Undeclared War at the library as part of the Cal Humanities 'Searching for Democracy' program.

I understand you were instrumental in bringing the late Dr. Leonard Shlain to speak at the library twice. How did that come about?

I first met Dr. Shlain in 1985. His daughter Kimberly, my roommate at UC Berkeley, invited me to her family home in Mill Valley for brunch. Over lox and bagels, Dr. Shlain engaged us in compelling conversations about art, geography, literature, politics and science. He spoke about fascinating convergences and connections that existed in the world and how emerging technologies would soon change the way we work, live and think. Years later, after reading Shlain's first book Art & Physics: Parallel Visions in Space, Time & Light, I writed him to speak at the library as a Manuscripts speaker with Art & Physics: 120 The next year, he joined us as speaker in the Distinguished Speakers Lecture Series with The Alphabet vs.The Goddess: The Conflict Between Word and Image. I was intrigued by Shlain's writings and loved how his incredible multimedia presentations of carefully curated visuals beautifully expressed his concepts.



Your name is synonymous with the Newport Beach Film Festival. Tell us when you got involved and what the Festival means to you.

In 2002, I came on board to launch the Festival's 'Special Programs' and the year-round 'Community Cinema' programs (Cinema Orange, Cinema Sage Hill). The Festival gives filmmakers a wonderful platform for artistic expression and offers the community an opportunity to see fresh independent cinema from around the globe and meet filmmakers.

Tell us about your family.

Originally from Portland, Oregon, my husband Peter is a Senior Portfolio Manager at Morgan Stanley and loves to ski, play guitar and read about history. Heather (15) plays on the Corona del Mar High School girls water polo team, loves photography and reading fiction. Sean (13) enjoys skiing, body surfing, editing films and playing flag football. We enjoy an active lifestyle on Balboa Island.

What are some of your passions?

I enjoy spending time with my family, kayaking, photography, design, tennis, running, painting, hiking, swimming, music, gardening, yoga, bicycling, reading, travel and collecting books about at and architecture.

What are some of your memories of reading, libraries and books?

Born with the 'curiosity gene,' I spent long hours during my youth exploring and reading at our public library and in the 'Bookmobile' that visited our L.A. neighborhood. While in college, I was amazed at UC Berkeley's vast repertoire of libraries and how each library offered a unique experience. I loved how the libraries were housed in architecturally relevant buildings with exhibitions and collections of rare books, manuscripts and pictorial collections to discover. I also enjoyed Berkeley's eclectic independent bookstores and its vibrant literary and cafe scene. My kids have fond memories of library story time, art workshops and searching for treasures in The Friends Bookstore. Spending time at the library certainly cultivated a love of reading for my family.

What do libraries mean to you, and what is are your thoughts on their future?

Libraries serve as the creative, intellectual and technology hubs of cities. We are fortunate to have such a fabulous gem of a library here in Newport Beach: a library that provides free public access to valuable resources ranging from books to cinema to digital multimedia and research tools, which offers amazing multicultural programs to people of all ages. The future of our library depends on support from our community and our leaders. We owe much gratitude to the Foundation and its members for keeping our library alive and thriving.

Bringing Financial Literacy to the Library

Financial literacy is critical in today's world. How does one live well now, provide for loved ones and leave a legacy? For more than seven years, the Library Foundation has offered the *It's Your Money* and *It's Your Estate* workshops to provide a safe space to receive invaluable information about all aspects of estate planning.

Peter C. Kote has been moderating these informative workshops for the Library Foundation since 2004 on a volunteer basis.

Peter explains, "We made some rules for the program that we still hold to today. No commercial sponsorship of the series, speakers would not collect contact information, and there would be no soliciting for a donation. Our goal was pure education with a bias towards encouraging folks to consider a charity in their estate plans. The motivation for the Irt's Your Estate series was my father's death. His last 30 days were spent at the hospital with an endotracheal tube down his throat until he could no longer speak or gesture. Our family had never discussed end of life issues and we had no legal documents."

Pete says, "The program is so satisfying to me when I read the positive evaluations from those who have attended, saying they will start the family conversation about money, investing, death and living."
