

# In LOCKDOWN LIBRARIES ARE LIFELINES

When our Library doors closed last spring due to lockdown, the library team quickly adapted and extended a lifeline of vital services to a community in need. This unprecedented global pandemic has revealed the importance and

relevance of keeping our Library up to date with the latest technology. Because of the Newport Beach Public Library's expansive eBranch offerings it was well positioned to continue serving a quarantined public with 24/7/365 access to ebooks, audiobooks, magazines, newspapers, databases, films, and the latest COVID-19 developments.


While the Library was well-prepared with its digital access, it swiftly implemented a "grab and go" service where patrons could reserve books for curbside pickup at all four branches. And when the lockdown loosened, the Central Branch opened its doors to allow patrons a safe way to browse the shelves, check out materials, and resume the use of public computers by appointment.

Library Services Director Tim Hetherton shared, "Shortly after the Governor issued the stay-at-home order, the Newport Beach Public Library implemented a service model that offered curbside pickup of library materials. curriculum support for online learning, virtual programming, and outdoor Wi-Fi access. Many library users have commented that these services have proven to be an essential element in their ability to cope with the effects of the pandemic." Hetherton goes on to describe the community's appreciation and support, "Many patrons have commented that the Library has served as an important resource when many other public amenities were unavailable. Others praised our continued provision of services that helped them feel connected to the rest of the world."

Meg Linton, Chief Executive Officer of the Newport Beach Public Library Foundation adds, "Thanks to the generosity of donors, our libraries were technologically up to date with the latest digital resources, and the Library team was able to meet the demand triggered by the pandemic. That's the power of Foundation membership."

The library lifeline is there for us as we continue to ride the rise and fall of the COVID-19 wave. Our Library offers safe access to the outside world and a much-needed escape while we observe the stay-at-home orders of the day. Because we have a stellar four-star rated public library, we still have places to go, explore, wander, and enrich our lives. And just like Mason Cooley has said, "Reading gives us somewhere to go when we have to stay."

#### Salt Heat Fat Acid: Mastering the Elements of Good Cooking Friday, January 15, 6:19pm




# P.J. O'Rourke

Sam Quinones' book Dreamland: The True Tale of America's Opiate Epidemic (2015) won a National Book Critics Circle Award and was on a dozen Best Book of the Year lists. Why? The book struck a common chord. Quinones is a masterful storyteller and sought-after speaker who shares how the silent tragedy has impacted communities and families coast to coast. And what a tale . . . Dreamland is riveting. Quinones recounts how a pharmaceutical corporation promoted its legal opiate prescription painkiller as non-addictive and the rise of international drug trafficking. 



#### A COLLABORATION WITH UCI HUMANITIES CENTER

The Newport Beach Public Library Foundation was awarded two prestigious grants from the Isidore & Penny Myers Foundation in the amount of \$19,361 and \$5,000 from California Humanities to support this new program collaboration with the UCI Humanities Center called **Stories from the Sea: An Oral History Project.** 

NBPLF has teamed up with a brilliant group of UCI students and professors in literary journalism, history, and humanities to design a virtual multigenerational, multi-media, oral history experience documenting community members' personal stories about Newport Beach. The goal is to uncover stories about living, working, and enjoying the sea and coast; development and conservancy of the shoreline and coastal waterways; untold stories of indigenous people and people of color; and other interests the students bring to the table.



We are seeking community elders with compelling tales and the willingness to share documentation such as photos, ephemera, film, or objects that the students can scan or reproduce. We are also looking for enthusiastic individuals who can commit a little time to spend with a student via phone, Zoom, or other virtual platforms. In spring 2021, the students will present their final research projects as an online community event. # *John* STAHR 1932-2020

John Stahr was, and his wife Elizabeth is, an integral figure in the creation of the Newport Beach Central Library and the Newport Beach Public Library Foundation.

The story begins in 1981 when the library trustees and management concluded that the existing 14,000-square-foot library was lacking in both collections and usable space. At the time, the fourlibrary system was the second-busiest municipal public library in California, so the trustees determined there was enough need and desire to build a 54,000 square foot Central Library. The project required a new development approach and in particular required substantial private funds.

John and Elizabeth Stahr created the Library Foundation in 1989 and began a fundraising campaign to secure \$1.5 million for the building. Unlike most capital campaigns with big gifts paving the way, the Stahrs recognized the importance of community involvement and saw the Library as a place for everyone to gather and learn. According to Elizabeth, "We tried to keep it a low-key, grass-roots campaign. No glitz and no black-tie dinners."

The Library is a place of inclusion and accessibility, and the Stahrs translated those values into a capital campaign for all and created a foundation built on popular support. The result was nothing less than a resounding success with children giving pennies, parents giving twenties, and corporations writing checks. Within a four-year period over 1,500 donations were received and only 20 of those gifts exceeded \$10,000. Public interest was high, people's hearts were open, and they gave at every level. The Stahrs exceeded the original goal by raising over \$2 million and the Central Library opened its doors in 1994. Elizabeth has often said, "This Library was built by the people of Newport Beach."

The Library Foundation is a paradigm for empowering private/public partnerships. John's son Walter Stahr shares his father's love of libraries and books, and now serves on the Library Foundation's Board of Directors. Walter said his father was proud of the library's success as a community hub and was extremely excited about the forthcoming Library Lecture Hall being designed by Robert R. Coffee Architect & Associates. The Stahrs have already committed funds to support the new capital campaign and we know John will be looking down with great pleasure when the first public program takes place in the Library's new Lecture Hall in the coming years.

## Foundation Dollars at Work


