

CENTRAL CELEBRATES 30

Next year, 2024, the Newport Beach community will celebrate the 30th anniversary of the beautiful, dynamic, Central Library. In 1989, under the remarkable leadership of Elizabeth and John Stahr, with the dedicated support of the Board of Library Trustees, a community-wide movement began to raise awareness of the need for a state-of-the-art Central Library. The Library Foundation was formed to raise \$2.2 million, twenty-five percent of the \$8.8 million required for the Newport Beach City Council's authorization to build a new Central Library.

The new Central Library opened in July 1994. In 1995, a year after the opening, the Newport Beach Public Library Foundation initiated an endowment campaign, led by Clarence Turner, to raise the necessary funds to ensure the long-term support of the Newport Beach Library system. That campaign raised an initial amount of \$1.4 million.

Through prudent management, the endowment has grown to nearly \$2.7 million. The earnings from the endowment have funded library capital and program improvements: the Media Lab, Broadcast Booth, Tech Toys, Stahr Children's Room, the Wayfinder at the entrance to the Library, the self-checkout computers, patron laptops, popular Library furniture, much of the eBranch, and so much more.

The Library Foundation wishes to carry forward the exceptional public service it has provided. To that end, the Foundation is pleased to announce the establishment of The Elizabeth and John Stahr Legacy Society to celebrate and memorialize the 30th anniversary of the Central Library and that couple's commitment to the greater Newport Beach community. The Stahr Legacy Society honors both those who have left an Estate Gift to the Foundation and those who have stated the intent to provide one in the future. Estate Gift Donors become recognized members of the exclusive Library Leadership Circle and are invited to participate in the Library Leadership Reception to open the Season and the Summer Solstice Celebration to close the Season. The names of members of the Stahr Legacy Society will also be listed in the Annual Report in the Fall Bookmark magazine.

A STELLAR SEASON

Thank you all for attending and being part of 2023 Witte Lecture Series and 2022-2023 Library Live Author Series. We are always grateful that so many community members attend our programs and trust that the Library Foundation can provide a space for learning, exploration, and sharing of knowledge. This season, presenters covered bioethics, debating kidney transplants with the audience, Korean history and culture, ocean photography and conservation, geopolitical power structures, science fiction that was far from fiction, and the tragedy of loss – just to name a few.

One common thread among all these diverse speakers was resilience. This season all our speakers spoke about resilience in different ways. We began with the author Rebecca Scherm. She took us on a journey into the future describing why we should empathize with our planet and not lose hope that we can weather the growing risks associated with technology, climate change and pandemics. Bill Plaschke, our second speaker, witnessed and documented the rebuilding of the Paradise High School football team from the small town of Paradise destroyed by the Camp Fire in November of 2018. A team that did not even have a football for their first practice because all their equipment was destroyed in the fire, rose to win the first game of the season. The win, the game, and the football team brought the town and its residents together.

Anne Applebaum (a sold-out event) started the 2023 Witte Lecture season outlining the model of autocracy used by many nations to maintain their power and wealth in both new and familiar ways. She described how fighting one autocratic nation such as Russia is even more complicated as we encounter the network of autocratic countries that collaborate to thwart our efforts. Despite this, she remains hopeful that people of Ukraine have not lost their voice and will continue to fight for the sake of democracy and respect for the rule of law.

The same goes for author and journalist Omar El Akkad and ocean conservationist photographer Cristina Mittermeier. They spoke about the negative impact and consequences of looking away from human tragedies, the destruction of our ocean ecosystem, and the demand for action. El Akkad conveyed the human tragedy of forced exodus in the story of one small boy and his will to live. Mittermeier's stunning photographs of the resilience of indigenous people and ocean life focused our attention on hope for the regeneration of our natural world.

Dr. Arthur Caplan dove into the ethical dilemma of the medical and the human condition. He proposed difficult cases to our audience to elicit an understanding of how important bioethics is in the practice of modern medicine.

Our Library Live series ended with a sold-out event with Min Jin Lee. She spoke about the history of Korea and the challenges of immigrants and subsequent generations to adapt and accept their dual identities.

Dr. Dacher Keltner was the last speaker for the Witte Lectures. He ended the season with a positive note and gave us a peek into the breadth of power and how bringing awe into your life leads to emotional resilience.

Finally, we are excited to unveil our programs for next season. We know the speakers will be equally engaging and thought provoking.

Fiona Hill is a senior fellow in the Center on the United States and Europe in the Foreign Policy program at Brookings Institute. Hill was appointed chancellor of Durham University, U.K., and is currently a Richard von Weizsäcker Fellow at the Robert Bosch Academy in Berlin. She served as deputy assistant to the president and senior director for European and Russian affairs on the U.S. National Security Council from 2017 to 2019, and as national intelligence officer for Russia and Eurasia at the National Intelligence Council from 2006 to 2009. She is the author of *There Is Nothing for You Here: Finding Opportunity in the 21st Century* and co-author with Clifford Gaddy of *Mr. Putin: Operative in the Kremlin.*





PHASE VIII SCULPTURE EXHIBITION

The Sculpture Exhibition in Civic Center Park is an integral feature of the Newport Beach Civic Center. The Park, which turned nearly half a million square feet of undeveloped land into a new public park, was designed by renowned landscape architectural firm Peter Walker and Partners (PWP). The City Arts Commission determined that a rotating exhibition, in which pieces are loaned for a 2-year period, was an optimal approach to bring sculpture to the City in a cost-efficient manner. Admission is free and the

exhibition continues to be enjoyed by residents and guests of all ages and sensibilities. The rotational nature of the exhibit ensures that residents and guests are exposed to a variety of work. Selected sculptures will be on loan to the City of Newport Beach for two years.



A LIFE IN IMAX

The Library Foundation held the first fundraiser on behalf of Witte Hall on January 28th to benefit the Hall's audio/visual Technology Fund. Inspired by the leadership of Lizanne Witte, the elegant evening at the Newport Beach Central Library showcased filmmaker Greg MacGillivray and MacGillivray Freeman Films. Over 180 people celebrated MacGillivray's career, from the maker of surf films to Hollywood masterpieces, to his 45 groundbreaking IMAX films, as revealed in his recently released memoir, *Five Hundred Summer Stories: A Life in IMAX*.

MacGillivray spoke about his life as the filmmaker of award-winning IMAX productions created to raise awareness about the natural world. His presentation included video clips of his films *Everest, To the Arctic,* and *Journey to the South Pacific.* To highlight the purpose of the evening, Greg mentioned that his films will look terrific on the planned 9' x 16' LED video wall display in Witte Hall. Everyone will be able to see both the video screen and the speaker from the planned tiered seating.

While Greg signed books, guests enjoyed a light dinner to music provided by Steve Wood and Beth Fitchett Wood of the acclaimed band Honk. The anticipated Witte Hall will transform the quality, and character of programs and events presented by the Newport Beach Public Library and Library Foundation as well as the extended Newport Beach community.

SPOTLIGHT ON SCIENCE

On May 4, the Library Foundation inaugurated a new lecture series for the community, Spotlight on Science. The concept of the program was initiated by Janet and Walkie Ray and Karen and Bruce Clark.

The Rays were the leaders of the effort to establish the Discovery Cube, and Janet still serves on its Board; Bruce Clark, PhD is a geologist and on the Advisory Board of the UCI Newkirk Center for Science and Society; and Karen Clark is the Chair of the Foundation Board. Their goal was to bring important scientific findings to the community. The first lecture, free to the community, by UCI Dean of Physical Sciences James Bullock, PhD, was fully registered within four days of announcing it to the Foundation members. Dr. Bullock chairs the James Webb Space Telescope Users' Committee, and has a major role in selecting who uses the telescope and the projects that the telescope photographs. He showed some of the most awe-inspiring photos taken by the JWST and shared the latest research findings on the origins and mysteries of the universe.

The success of this initial lecture, with audience surveys stating that they want more "Spotlights on Science", means that the Foundation will be planning three programs for the coming 2023-2024 season. BOOKS | FINANCE | MEDICINE

ENORMOUS THANKS

"Volunteering is the ultimate exercise in democracy. You vote in elections once a year, but when you volunteer, you vote every day about the kind of community you want to live in." – Marjorie Moore

The three pillars of *Time, Talent, and Treasure* distinguish American philanthropy. In our state of California, over 5.7 million residents volunteered more than 380 million hours for a nonprofit or government organization last year. That's over 67 hours per year for each volunteer. It is truly why the nonprofit sector is recognized as the "Voluntary Sector."

The financial impact? Independent Sector annually evaluates the value of a volunteer hour of service by state. California's value is \$35.56 per hour. The Newport Beach Public Library's community of over 300 volunteers has an annual value of at least \$714,756!

The bedrocks of philanthropy, Time and Talent, empower the Newport Beach Public Library to succeed in its mission to be the cultural, educational, and informational heart of Newport Beach.

The Board of Library Trustees, with five members, governs the Library, makes policy, and oversees the administration of the Newport Beach Library system.

The Friends of the Library, with nearly 100 volunteers, manages the Friends Bookstore and the three large book sales in the Friends Room. The Friends contribute \$200,000 a year to the Library for programs and services.

Project Adult Literacy, with over 80 volunteers who serve as Tutors and Assessors, has won numerous accolades. The volunteers dedicate their time to developing the literacy skills of adults, empowering them to achieve greater success in their lives.

Youth Services, with over 70 volunteers, mostly teens, review books, assist in the Children's Department, or participate in the Young Adult Advisory Council. Library volunteers also deliver books and other materials to Homebound Patrons who cannot get to any of the library branches.

The Library Foundation has over 50 dedicated volunteers that commit their time to the Foundation's governance, programs, and financial support as Board members and committee members. The members of the Library Live and the Witte Lecture Series committees research potential speakers and authors and select the presenters by identifying key themes, important books, interesting authors, and topics of interest to the community. The committee volunteers whittle down the long list of potential speakers and authors to the four selected for each season's Witte and Library Live premier series. The Library Foundation volunteers assist at the lecture presentations, for fundraising and member events, and advise on the Beyond Books capital campaign for Witte Hall. 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THE IRA CHARITABLE ROLLOVER

When it comes to charitable giving, many people are familiar with using a required minimum distribution (RMD) from their retirement accounts to make donations. However, there is another option that can be even more beneficial: using a qualified charitable distribution (QCD). The qualified charitable distribution is often called the IRA Charitable Rollover.

A QCD is a direct transfer of funds from an IRA, up to \$100,000 per year, to a qualified charitable organization. The transfer counts toward the IRA owner's RMD but is not included in their taxable income. In contrast, an RMD taken as a distribution and then donated to charity would be included in the IRA owner's taxable income, even if they itemize deductions.

There are several advantages to using a QCD over an RMD for charitable giving. First, it can reduce the IRA owner's taxable income, which can have a significant impact on their overall tax liability. For example, if an IRA owner's RMD is \$50,000 and they donate \$10,000 to charity, their taxable income would still be \$50,000. However, if they make a QCD of \$10,000 to charity, their taxable income would be reduced to \$40,000.

Second, using a QCD can provide a tax benefit for those who do not itemize their deductions. The standard deduction for 2023 is \$13,850 for individuals and \$27,700 for married couples filing jointly. If an IRA owner's itemized deductions are less than the standard deduction, they would not receive any tax benefit from their charitable donation. However, by using a QCD, they can still receive a tax benefit by reducing their taxable income.

Third, using a QCD can help reduce the IRA owner's Medicare premiums. Medicare premiums are based on income, so reducing taxable income can help lower these premiums. For example, in 2023, individuals with incomes over \$97,000 and married couples with incomes over \$194,000 will pay higher Medicare premiums. By using a QCD to reduce their taxable income, an IRA owner can potentially lower their Medicare premiums.

Fourth, using a QCD can help simplify the charitable giving process. With an RMD, the IRA owner must take the distribution, pay taxes on the distribution, and then donate the remaining funds to charity. With a QCD, the funds are directly transferred to the charity, eliminating the need for the IRA owner to take a distribution and pay taxes on the funds.

Finally, using a QCD can help ensure that the charity receives the full benefit of the donation. With an RMD, the IRA owner may have to pay taxes on the distribution, reducing the amount that can be donated to charity. With a QCD, the funds are directly transferred to the charity, ensuring that they receive the full benefit of the donation.

In conclusion, using a QCD for charitable giving can be a smart financial move for IRA owners. It can reduce taxable income, provide a tax benefit for those who do not itemize their deductions, help reduce Medicare premiums, simplify the charitable giving process, and ensure that the charity receives the full benefit of the donation. 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
