# Celebrating 30 Years of the Central Library and Investing in the Future

In 2024 the Foundation celebrates two milestones. It was 35 years ago that Elizabeth and John Stahr gathered advocates in the community and began a movement to convince the City Council that Newport Beach needed a central library that would be a reflection of the quality of this City and be the educational and cultural center for Newport Beach and its surrounding communities. That group of dedicated citizens became the Newport Beach Library Foundation. The Foundation, with the support of the Library Trustees, launched a capital campaign that raised \$2.2 million (over \$4.5 million in today's dollars!) to help fund the construction of the Central Library. In July 1994 the Central Library opened its doors. Look for announcements of special events to celebrate 30 years of serving the public—of all ages—in 2024.

Thirty years later, our patrons crowd the library for Library Live and Witte Lectures, for the Library's Sunday Musicales, for children's programs like Storytime and Crafternoons and our read to a dog program, to hear local authors, medical professionals and scientists, to use the computers, Media Lab, and Broadcast Booth and, yes, to borrow books.

# ART AT THE LIBRARY Oriana Poindexter, February 12 - April 5

Oriana Poindexter is a photographer and marine scientist focused on the intersection of art, science, and the marine realm. Oriana earned her degrees from Princeton and the Scripps Institute of Oceanography at UC San Diego. She went on to work for nearly a decade with academic institutions, government agencies, and environmental organizations as an expert in the sustainable seafood and fisheries management arenas.



Today she focuses on interdisciplinary projects that bridge art and science, applying her expertise in both fields to engage the senses, inspire awe, and impact positive change for the oceans. Her photographs and cyanotypes have been featured by the Getty Museum and The Wall Street Journal, and she has created interpretive visual exhibits for the Aquarium of the Pacific and the Birch Aquarium. Oriana is based in San Diego, where she is working on her first book, The Iridescent Ones, to visualize the natural and cultural history of abalone species on the Pacific Coast. ### Tracking Ice and Water in a Changing Climate with AI

Eric Rignot, PhD. Professor – Earth System Science, UCI Isabella Velicogna, PhD. Professor – Earth System Science, UCI

Wednesday, March 20, 2024, 7:00pm Doors open at 6:30pm

Drs. Rignot and Velicogna are professors in the department of Earth Science at UCI, and are senior scientists of NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory.

Both of them are world-renowned glaciologists who study the effects of global climate change on polar ice sheets. Their research uses satellites to understand the dynamics of glacier ice in Antarctica, Greenland, Alaska, and Patagonia. Dr. Rignot is a recipient of the NASA Exceptional Scientific Achievement Medal.

Dr. Velicogna was honored with Joanne Simpson Medal from American Geophysical Union for her trailblazing research.



### Digital Tools for Projecting Coastal Erosion and Flooding

Brett Sanders, PhD. Professor – Department of Civil and Environmental Engineering, UCI

Dr. Sanders is a professor of Civil and Environmental Engineering at UCI. # HUMAN STORIES BEHIND LIBRARY NUMBERS

There are many things the Newport Beach Public Library does that can be easily quantified: counting how many patrons visit the buildings on any given day, how many items are checked out, how many library cards are issued, how many reference questions answered, and how many people attend a program.

But what about the human stories behind those numbers? There are human connections that are made every day: children attending their first storytime, patrons getting their first library card, staff connecting people to much needed social services. Library staff are able to witness and be a part of life-changing moments every day, such as an adult learner reading on their own for the first time or a patron using technology to connect with a long-lost family member.

We refer to these connections as "touches" and in the 2022-2023 fiscal year, the Library had over 3,000,000 patron touches. Those touches are not just people coming through the doors of Central and the three neighborhood libraries, but people using the eBranch of eBooks and audiobooks, over 60 searchable databases, eMagazines, streaming videos, and the Beanstack tracking platform. It includes the Passport service, test proctoring, program attendance including the Adult Literacy program, use of the public computers, Media Lab, and Broadcast Booth, and people that call the Library for specific information. 3,000,000 touches a year. That is community impact. Oftentimes people come to the Library when they are at a low point in their lives. Staff are able to offer a warm, friendly smile and a touch of human kindness in what can seem like an inhumane world. Libraries have always done this. Everyone who walks through the doors are welcome to enjoy the resources and the environment.

We are here to help however we can. For most of us it is more than just a job. We're proud to know that we make a real difference in our community and the lives of everyone who chooses to come through our doors.

# CHANGING LIVES THROUGH PROJECT ADULT LITERACY

The Newport Beach Public Library's Project Adult Literacy (PAL) Program provides free help for adults to improve their reading and writing skills. The program creates a foundation for its learners to achieve greater success in their lives.

Sarah, a 31-year-old female, joined PAL in 2022. She has severe learning disabilities and anxiety issues. These challenges, compounded with her inability to read and write, have made her life very challenging. In fact, Sarah was homeless when she learned about PAL. She did not know a program like this existed. Sarah joined and was matched with a tutor to work with her on a weekly basis.

Despite numerous challenges, Sarah has been committed to PAL. When Sarah first joined PAL, it was difficult for her to write a simple sentence. A year later, she can write sentences, short speeches, and thank you letters. Listen to what Sarah wrote about her experience transitioning from homelessness to housing:

"I am truly grateful. I'm living in my place for 6 months. I have a roof over my head. It's a new experience and a new journey."

Project Adult Literacy has helped Sarah express herself in new ways. It has given her a voice. The confidence this has given her has helped make positive changes in her life. She's registered at Orange Coast College, began volunteering at her church, and has shown a desire to become more involved in the community. For these reasons and more, Sarah was selected as the PAL recipient of the 2023 Rochelle Hoffman Memorial Award for outstanding achievement. She is truly a capable and deserving individual. We are so proud of Sarah and all the success that she has made!

# MAKING A STRATEGIC END OF TAX YEAR GIFT TO THE LIBRARY FOUNDATION

The Library Foundation accepts contributory support in a variety of ways. As you make your plans for your end of the calendar year contribution to the Foundation, consider options other than a cash contribution. Of course, we recommend that you consult with your attorney or tax advisor to find the most beneficial means of contributing to the Foundation. There is full information on the Foundation's website NBPLF.Foundation under the Ways to Give tab.

You may consider the following options:

### DONOR ADVISED FUNDS

A Donor-Advised Fund (DAF) is like your own charitable savings account. You contribute to the fund as frequently as you like and then recommend grants to nonprofits like the Library Foundation, while potentially earning immediate tax benefits. There are specific IRS regulations regarding the benefits you can receive as the "advisor" for your DAF. The Library Foundation cannot provide any benefit other than "incidental benefits." As such, for a contribution from a DAF, the Foundation cannot give complimentary tickets. If you are a client of Fidelity Charitable, Schwab Charitable, or BNY Mellon you can easily make a designation through the DAF Direct window on the Foundation website. If your DAF is with another charitable fund or trust, contact your financial advisor or trust administrator for details.

### DIGITAL OR CRYPTOCURRENCY

The Library Foundation accepts contributions of digital or crypto-currency through the nonprofit organization every. org. Every.org accepts the digital currency, issues IRS documentation to you, converts the currency to dollars and transmits it to the Foundation. You receive a tax deduction for the full price of the currency at the time of the gift through every.org. Like a Donor Advised Fund gift, you will receive recognition and incidental benefits for the full amount of the contribution. A link to donate digital currency is on the website.

### RETIREMENT PLAN CONTRIBUTIONS— THE IRA CHARITABLE ROLLOVER

A special opportunity for those 70½ years old and older is the Qualified Charitable Distribution. You can give any amount (up to a maximum of \$100,000) per year from your IRA directly to a qualified charity such as the Library Foundation without having to pay income taxes on the money. This popular gift option is commonly called the IRA charitable rollover, but you may also see it referred to as a qualified charitable distribution, or QCD for short. ### STOCK TRANSFERS

The Foundation accepts shares of stock which are sold upon receipt and directed to the Annual Fund, Endowment Fund, or other program in accordance with your designation. To donate shares of stock, the Foundation website has specific directions for your broker. Because of holiday time delays in transmitting from your brokerage account to the Foundation's brokerage account, we recommend that you generate the transfer at least 14 days before the end of the tax year.

### CREDIT CARD

If you are contributing by credit card, the Foundation recommends you do so through the secure giving page on our website. You also have the option of contributing directly from your checking account through the ACH option on that page. There is also a downloadable form if you want to send your contribution through the mail, or you can use the return envelope enclosed in this Bookmark.

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# Dear NBPLF Members and Friends,

After guiding the Library Foundation through the pandemic, the shift to virtual programming, a return to in-person programming, hiring a new CEO, negotiating a Memorandum of Understanding with the City of Newport Beach to raise 50% of the funds needed to build a state-of-the-art lecture hall/civic auditorium, Karen Heath Clark passed the leadership of the Board of Directors to me in June of 2023. Karen deserves praise for her steady hand and wisdom in guiding the Foundation during these past years and I will rely on her guidance during my tenure as Chair of the Board.

The Foundation has seen valued Board members complete their tenure as leaders of the Foundation. Completing their service to the Foundation are Dorothy Larson, Toby Larson, John Prichard, Lizanne Witte, Adrian Windsor, and Felix Yan. Dorothy Larson and Antonella Castro remain Library leaders by being appointed to the Library Board of Trustees. Lizanne Witte and Adrian Windsor continue their volunteer service as members of Board Committees. We value these volunteer leaders who have served the Foundation and the Library.

Joining the Foundation Board are Linda Beimfohr, Joy Brenner, Randy Heyler, Emilie Menghin, and Mireya Llaurado. I welcome their commitment and look forward to working with them to fulfill the Foundation's mission to "fund valuable library resources and engage the community through diverse literary, cultural, and intellectual programs."

This past year we continued the campaign for Witte Hall, Beyond Books, chaired by Jill Johnson-Tucker. The Hall, a civic auditorium for the Newport Beach community, continues to draw support from community leaders. Rising costs have had a significant impact on the construction bids for the project, but the Foundation is confident that the community will philanthropically support this critical addition to the Library and Civic Center. It was 30 years ago in 1994 that the Central Library opened its doors to the Newport Beach community. It was the Foundation, established by the foresight and drive of John and Elizabeth Stahr, and joined by many Newport Beach community leaders, which advocated for a Central Library and raised \$2.2 million, 25% of the eventual cost, for its construction. That insight of the need for a Central Library has resulted in an institution that, as Library Services Manager Rebecca Lightfoot documented, has three million "touches" with patrons each year. That support has provided a library for the Newport Beach community that is rated a "Four Star" library—the only "Star" library in Orange County and one of only twelve in California.

Your continued contributory support as members and as ticket purchasers to the Witte Lectures and Library Live, and attendance of our free programs of Medicine in Our Backyard, Financial Literacy Workshop, Spotlight on Science, and the Book Discussion Group, makes the Library Foundation an important and vital partner of the Newport Beach Public Library. I urge you to continue your support, increase it if possible, and encourage your family, friends, and colleagues to join you in that support.

We are also seeking leadership volunteers to join our Board of Directors and Board committees. Feel free to contact me or CEO Jerold Kappel to learn how you can be part of the future of the Foundation and the great Library it serves.

### PROGRAMS

The Foundation presented 45 programs in the 2022-2023 season, 30 of which were free for the community. Free programs included Medicine in Our Backyard, the Financial Literacy Workshops, Book Discussion Group, and the new initiative, Spotlight on Science. The Foundation continues its successful partnership with the University of California Irvine Health for the Medicine series and has begun a partnership with UCI Science for the Spotlight on Science series, which will expand to three programs this current season. Total attendance for the programs presented by the Foundation was over 3800.

The demand for the Foundation's program is strong, with both Library Live presentations this fall sold out and the Spotlight on Science first lecture over-registered. Medicine in Our Backyard and the Financial Literacy Workshops and the Book Discussion Group were all back to pre-pandemic attendance, and often exceeding it.

### WITTE DISTINGUISHED AUTHOR SERIES

The 26th season of the Witte Lectures kicked off with a SOLD-OUT event featuring Pulitzer Prize winning journalist and author Anne Applebaum. Over 1300 people attended the Winter-Spring 2023 Witte Lecture Series. Audience members were enthused to be able to attend compelling presentations by:

- Anne Applebaum, author of Twilight of Democracy: The Seductive Lure of Authoritarianism
- Arthur Caplan, PhD, renowned medical ethicist, spoke on Ethical Challenges on the Frontiers of Medicine
- Cristina Mittermeier, National Geographic and Smithsonian Conservation photographer, spoke on *Enoughness: Ocean Conservation*
- Dacher Keltner, Ph.D., visionary and Faculty Director of the Berkeley Greater Good Science Center, spoke on *The Promise and Peril of Power in the 21st Century* and on his research and book on *Awe*

#### LIBRARY LIVE

Library Live featured a wide array of authors in a variety of genres including science and historical fiction that gave rise to stories of immigration, identity, climate change and refugee crises. The speakers were:

#### SPOTLIGHT ON SCIENCE

The Library Foundation initiated a new free program that will focus on innovative and exciting scientific research, utilizing extraordinary and renowned scientists from our local universities. The first event was held on May 4, 2023, with James Bullock, PhD., Dean of UCI Physical Sciences. The free event was over-registered in 5 days and was very successful. Dr. Bullock captivated us with the stunning images from the James Webb Space Telescope. Enthusiastic audience feedback has prompted the Foundation to program three Spotlight on Science presentations this season.

#### MEDICINE IN OUR BACKYARD

Through the Library Foundation's partnership with UCI Health and the support of Mike and Polly Smith, Medicine in Our Backyard engaged internationally renowned UCI medical faculty to address a broad range of health issues: nutrition, breast cancer, hearing loss, Alzheimer's disease, heart failure, Crohn's disease, aging and the spine, and skin cancers. As many as 150 people registered for these free lectures, each ending with a wide-ranging Q & A exchange with the audience.

### FINANCIAL LITERACY WORKSHOPS

The Financial Literacy Workshops started in September and saw an increase in participation, exceeding prepandemic numbers. The workshops are free programs presented by the Library Foundation for the public. Financial Literacy presents *It's Your Money Series* in the Fall and *It's Your Estate* workshop in the Spring. Each series has six workshops.

### **BOOK DISCUSSION GROUP**

This free program also saw a significant increase in participation. The Discussion Group, curated and moderated by Director of Programs Kunga Wangmo, suggests books to read and discuss, and then Kunga Wangmo curates the suggestions and includes the works by the Library Live authors who will speak on that series for the season. Book Discussion Group begins in September and ends in May for nine sessions.

### VIDEOS

Due to licensing restrictions, videos of the Witte Lecture and Library Live series are available on the Foundation's website free for members of the Foundation. The Medicine in Our Backyard video archives are available on the Foundation's website free to both Members and non-Members.

#### **MEMBER EVENTS**

The season opened with the annual Library Leadership Reception in the Bamboo Courtyard, celebrating those Foundation donors that make generous annual contributions to fund the Witte Lectures, Library Live, and other Foundation programs as well as provide support for the Foundation's support of the Newport Beach Library. As you walk along the portico in front of the Central Library you will see tiles with the names of those that have made leadership contributions over the past 30 years.

The season ended with a Summer Solstice Reception in the Bamboo Courtyard celebrating new members of the Foundation, Library Leadership Circle donors, and distinguished guests. At this event the Foundation honored Mike and Polly Smith who have sponsored Medicine in Our Backyard since its inception ten years ago. After the reception, Susan Straight, Southern California awardwinning author, spoke about her book, *Mecca*, which is a homage to Southern California. She was very well received and her novels were available for purchase and signing after her presentation.


# SPECIAL EVENT IN SUPPORT OF THE TECHNOLOGY FUND FOR WITTE HALL

In January, the Foundation hosted a presentation by Greg MacGillivray of MacGillivray Freeman Films on the publication of his memoir *Five Hundred Summer Stories: A Life in Imax.* MacGillivray spoke about his life as the filmmaker of 45 groundbreaking and award-winning IMAX productions created to raise awareness about the natural world. Attendees celebrated MacGillivray's outstanding career and raised funds to support the audio/visual technology that will make Witte Hall an outstanding experience.

### FINANCIAL OVERVIEW

The Foundation had a 7.7% increase in contributed revenue for the fiscal year, and with earned revenue from the Witte Lectures and Library Live presentations, the Foundation experienced an overall net operating revenue increase of 12%. This excludes the Paycheck Protection Program grant of \$100,000 that was forgiven in Fiscal 2022.

Operating expenses were on budget, and revenue exceeded expenses by nearly \$30,000. The Foundation contributed \$48,600 to the Library and underwrote \$49,290 in campaign expenses for the Beyond Books capital campaign for Witte Hall. Total programming was \$320,780 of which \$100,180 was for free community programming. Overall, the Foundation provided support to the Library of over \$197,000.



The Foundation raised \$2.9 million in the capital campaign for Witte Hall with an additional \$5.2 million in confirmed gift agreements. The Foundation's endowment, restricted to support of the Library, is \$2.97 million.

The Foundation has received a Platinum rating for transparency from Guidestar.org (Candid) and a Four Star rating from Charity Navigator. These independent rating agencies assure donors, and the community, that contributions will be stewarded, used for the intended purpose, and managed for the good of the Foundation, the Newport Beach Library, and the community that uses and enjoys the Library. The Foundation's audit and IRS Form 990 are on the Foundation's website under the About/Financial Responsibility tab.
