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

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
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

Friday, January 24, 7:00pm / Saturday, January 25, 2:00pm




## **Christine Brennan**

### Juliette Kayyem In conversation with Jacob Ware National Security, Climate Migration & Pandemics: Managing Risks in a Borderless World

Professor Juliette Kayyem is an international leader in crisis management and homeland security, serving as the faculty chair of the Homeland Security and Global Health Projects at Harvard's Kennedy School of Government. Previously, she served as President Obama's Assistant Secretary at the Department of Homeland Security and as Massachusetts Governor Deval Patrick's Homeland Security Advisor. A CNN Senior National Security Analyst, Pulitzer Prize finalist, and contributing writer for *The Atlantic* and Boston's local NPR station, GBH. Kayyem is the author of *The Devil Never Sleeps: Learning to Live in an Age of Disasters*.

Jacob Ware is a research fellow at the Council on Foreign Relations and an adjunct professor at Georgetown University's Edmund A. Walsh School of Foreign Service, where he teaches a class on domestic terrorism. He serves on the editorial board at the Modern War Institute at West Point for Conflict & Terrorism and the Irregular Warfare Initiative. He was also a visiting fellow at the University of Oslo's Center for Research on Extremism.


## **M. Chris Fabricant**

### Lessons in Chemistry Friday, October 4, 6:00pm\*



# Javier Zamora in conversation with Gustavo Arellano


## Solito: Home, Identity, and the Immigrant Experience Thursday, February 27, 7:00pm

What is the meaning of home? At only nine years old, Javier Zamora left his native El Salvador to embark on a 3000-mile journey to reunite with his parents in the United States. Alone except for the other migrants in his group and the "coyote" hired to guide them across the border, he survived perilous trips across oceans and deserts. Javier Zamora shares his harrowing journey and explores how identity influences our ideas of home and brings humanity and warmth to the figure of the "immigrant," stressing there are always moments of joy, love, and hope, even in the worst of circumstances. Zamora puts a face to child immigrants and the humanitarian crisis along the US-Mexico border.



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## HOW THE IMPOSSIBLE BECAME POSSIBLE

A brief history of the development of the Central Library by Clarence Turner as told to Tom Johnson, Publisher, *Stu News* 

The Newport Beach Central Library just celebrated 30 years in the Newport Beach Civic Center location this summer.

There are many people responsible for attaining that accomplishment, but one name that certainly should be near the top of nearly any list is former Newport Beach Mayor and City Councilman Clarence "Bus" Turner. Following his election to city council in 1986, he immediately got involved in the efforts to build a new Central Library. At the time the city's library consisted of a branch system with a small central library in Newport Center. However, he knew that such a project as building a new central library could be controversial. In fact, Turner at that time was called aside by then-City Manager Bob Wynn who told him "there weren't four votes on the council to support the effort," and that "he himself had his own doubts."

Still, Turner persevered. First up was a study of "what the city actually needed in a library, where would it be located (if it were built) and how would it be funded?"

Under his leadership, Turner and his councilmates authorized \$10,000 to have "a study completed in the summer of 1987 recommending "a 54,000-sq.-ft. facility."

Next up, where? According to Turner, "six different sites were evaluated, before council finally turned to the Irvine Company in search of a final answer. Ultimately, a land swap and cash transaction occurred between the city and the Irvine Company, making the 1.7-acre site where it is now located the new home.

Still, how would they fund the project? Turner admitted that "a number of methods were suggested, including a sale-lease back, general obligations bonds, borrowing from surplus city funds and Certificates of Participation."

The council adopted the Certificates of Participation funding mechanism method. At that point, Turner believed



"the heavy lifting was behind us." He even admitted that "the tenor of the council shifted from apprehension (for the project), to how do we make it work."

Enter John and Elizabeth Stahr and their contribution and subsequent raising of over \$2,200,000, of what would be needed to complete the entire new library.

Through continued support and fundraising from the Stahrs and the Library Foundation, along with Turner and other city leadership, the money was raised, and the Central Library became a reality.

On July 10, 1994, with Turner presiding as mayor of the city, the dedication of the Central Library took place. "The impossible became possible," according to Turner.

With 100% council support, the dedication gathering was "an opportunity to thank all of those unsung people who came together to make (it) happen."

Years later, Turner proudly shared, "On a personal note, I could reflect on the irony of coming from a background where books were rare to helping create a library of this magnitude...it was gratifying. I owe a lot to Newport Beach citizens for the trust they gave me to help complete (it)." Now, years later, Turner is re-engaged. "Once again, the citizens of Newport Beach are called upon to lend their support to help fund a badly needed expansion of (our) library. This expansion is for a lecture hall at a cost of \$23,400,000, one half to be paid for by the city and one half to be paid by through the fundraising efforts of the Newport Beach Public Library Foundation.

"It is with pleasure that Janice and I have pledged to make a major donation to the library building fund," said Turner. "One may wonder why, so I will tell you.

"Our core belief is that libraries are the storage facilities of humanity's dreams, aspirations, failures, inventions, literature, laws and indeed the history of our planet. Without them each generation would be denied wisdom left behind by previous generations. With them current and future generations can improve the lot for their generations while laying bricks in the building of progress.

"We speak from the standpoint of a former school principal and a guy who discovered the wealth contained between the covers of books."

## LEGACY

Communities are strengthened and made vibrant by those who create a legacy by supporting institutions and nonprofit organizations that serve the community.

Newport Beach Public Library patrons have greatly benefited from those who have made legacy contributions to the Newport Beach Public Library Foundation.

When you walk through the front doors of the Central Library and look to your left you will see a wall of names of the hundreds of donors whose legacy is the beautiful Central Library—a building filled with young and old seeking knowledge, adventure, mystery, and whimsy. Books, films, music, technology, meetings, and lectures all make this building a community resource and gathering place that exists because these donors gave a legacy to Newport Beach by contributing to the campaign to build the Central Library in the early 1990s.

If you walk down the portico to the left of the main entrance towards the Bamboo Courtyard (soon to be closed because of the construction of Witte Hall), you will see names on the wall tiles of the donors who have continued to make a major contribution to the Foundation for support of the Library.

Walk around the Central Library and the three branches— Corona del Mar, Balboa, and Crean Mariners-and see the plaques with names of the donors and businesses that have made a special gift. The Foundation offices have the names of William and Barbara Roberts, Arnold and Ruth Feuerstein, Glen and Dorothy Stillwell, and Eugenia B. Dean.

The Central Library celebrated the 30th anniversary of its grand opening this July. *Library Journal* recognizes the Newport Beach Library as a "Four Star" library, the only "Star" library in Orange County. Exceptional patron services, and the three million patron "touches" this Library makes annually, is the legacy of the donors who invested in the vision of an outstanding Library in Newport Beach. There is another group of legacy donors to celebrate. In 1996, former Newport Beach mayor Clarence Turner realized that for the Foundation to be sustainable and support the Newport Beach Library for years to come, an endowment was necessary. That successful campaign resulted in an endowment whose proceeds have funded critical capital improvements and patron services for the past two decades. The legacy of the donors to the endowment are the Media Lab, the Broadcast Lab, Tech Toys, the Wayfinder at the main entrance, self-checkout machines, laptops for use in the Library, the Business Center, Stahr Children's Room furniture and audio/video equipment, stand-up computer desks, eBranch databases, and so much more.

## The community can be part of the legacy of Newport Beach once more.

On February 27, the ground was broken for the construction of Witte Hall, the lecture hall and civic auditorium on the grounds of the Newport Beach Public Library. Witte Hall, so named with the lead gift from William Witte and Keiko Sakamoto, is a ten-year vision for a hall that will transform the quality and character of programs and events of the Newport Beach Public Library as well as the extended Newport Beach community. It will enrich people's lives and be a source of pride for the community by providing informative and entertaining programming of literary, cultural, artistic, and educational value. Lectures, music, films, educational and entertaining, will enliven this "jewel of the Civic Center."

The lobby of Witte Hall is the Louise and Roy Woolsey Memorial Lobby and the courtyard, named the Stahr Courtyard with a major gift from the founder of the Library Foundation, Elizabeth Stahr, will provide outdoor space for pre- and post- events.

Just as for the building of the Central Library, Witte Hall is a public/philanthropic partnership. The Library Foundation is raising 50% of the funds needed to build Witte Hall. Donors to the Hall will be creating a legacy for generations—a legacy of community support, not just for a building, but for the thousands of young people, students, and adults whose lives will be enriched by Witte Hall.


We have a strong youthful Board and a strong youthful (yet experienced) Director and Senior Staff.

#### SAXOPHONE & PIANO DUO, SOPHIA FLORES & ANDREW EDWARDS Sunday, September 15, 2024



Imagine if Tom Petty, George Harrison, Roy Orbison, Bob Dylan, and Jeff Lynne took the stage together live to perform a concert full of their greatest hits! Well it almost happened in the 1980's when these 5 legends of rock and roll joined forces to form the Super Band 'The Traveling Wilburys'. Here are the highlights from the Witte Lectures Series. Fiona Hill, the former deputy assistant to the President and an expert on Russian affairs, started our Witte season with incredible sold-out events. She spoke candidly about working for the Trump administration and on the rise of Vladimir Putin. In a similar vein, the nation's foremost legal correspondents, Dahlia Lithwick and Georgetown Law Professor Michele Goodwin unpacked the Supreme Court's recent rulings on everything from reproductive rights to the second amendment. We also watched Pulitzer Prize winner Ed Yong captivate audiences with his insights into animal behavior and their super senses. Finally, Richard Reeves, an economist and president of the American Institute for Boys and Men offered a compelling analysis of the social, economic, and political forces at work on men and boys that have left them overlooked and underpowered in America.


#### 2023-2024 SEASON

Library Live continued to have a strong season this year. This season's events were particularly notable for their diverse topics. Lisa See, a national bestselling author, presented her new book, Lady Tan's Circle of Women, which tells the captivating story of a 15th-century Chinese woman doctor. Steve Lopez, a multiple Pulitzer Prize-winning Los Angeles Times columnist, shared a humorous look at his experience writing Independence Day, a book about aging and retirement. International bestselling journalist Michael Scott Moore offered a gripping account of his ordeal in his book, The Desert and the Sea, detailing his 955-day kidnapping by Somali pirates. The season ended with National Book Award winner Tess Gunty in conversation with Professor of Journalism at UCI Patricia Pierson, about her debut novel The Rabbit Hutch and being a writer during the age of Artificial Intelligence (AI).

Our new free program Spotlight on Science started this season with a sold-out event on artificial intelligence and the science behind it with Distinguished Professor of Computer Science at UCI, Padhraic Smyth, PhD. Our next two speakers



were world renowned glaciologists Eric Rignot, PhD, and Isabella Velicogna, PhD, who each gave us a peek into their projects which uses AI technologies and satellites to track ice to predict the long term impact of melting glacier on our climate, and using the same tools to predict weather patterns to help California manage its water supply for the coming dry season. The final speaker, Brett Sanders, PhD, spoke extensively on different technologies that are being used to monitor sand movements along our local coastline to identify the cause and hopefully a solution to beach loss that so many of our beach towns are experiencing.

The Medicine in our Backyard series continues to foster engagement and help the community to understand health and medical advances from experts at UCI Health. The Financial Literacy Workshops bring the latest advances in financial and estate planning from ethical professionals to an ever-inquisitive audience. Finally, our Book Discussion Group has been growing ever since the end of the pandemic closure and has allowed our readers to connect, learn and share their thoughts about a myriad of books—from *Lessons in Chemistry* to *Frankenstein*-and make new friends!

As the season came to an exciting end, we are very thrilled to present our next season, with a goal to build on this success and continue to provide an enriching and thought-provoking experience for all.







## Strategic Giving Options to Transform Your Philanthropy

The Library Foundation accepts contributions of securities, Donor Advised Funds, real estate, estate gifts, IRA Qualified Charitable Distributions, and even cryptocurrency to fulfill your charitable intent.

Please consult with your attorney or tax advisor to find out the most beneficial means of contributing to the Library through the Library Foundation. You may be able to realize substantial tax savings for yourself, your family and future heirs. To learn more about ways to give, contact the Foundation at CEO@nbplf.foundation or 949-717-3890.

#### **Contributions of Stock**

Donating appreciated stock to the Newport Beach Public Library Foundation offers a double tax benefit, making it an attractive option for a charitable gift.

- Avoid Capital Gains Tax: When you sell appreciated stock (stock that has increased in value since you bought it), you typically owe capital gains tax on the profit. By donating the appreciated stock directly to the Foundation, you bypass paying capital gains tax altogether.
- 2. Charitable Deduction: You can deduct the fair market value (FMV) of the donated stock from your taxable income, which reduces your overall tax burden. The fair market value is determined by the date the Foundation receives the stock gift and is the median of the high and low price of the stock.

Stock Transfer Instructions for your broker are available on the Foundation's website under the Ways to Give tab.

#### **Donor Advised Funds**

Donor Advised Funds (DAFs) are a tax-efficient way to manage charitable donations. Donor Advised Funds allow donors to make a charitable contribution, receive an immediate tax deduction, and then recommend grants from the fund over time. You can contribute cash, appreciated assets, or investments that have been held for more than a year without paying capital gains taxes. You can contribute to your account and grant to a charity at any time, not just at year-end.

If you are a client of Fidelity Charitable, Schwab Charitable (now DAFgiving360), and BNY Mellon you can easily make a designation through the DAF Direct window on the Foundation's website under Ways to Give.

If your DAF is with another charitable fund or trust, please contact your financial advisor or trust administrator directly for details. For further information, call (949) 717-3890.

Please note that there are specific IRS regulations regarding benefits the Foundation can provide to an "advisor" of a DAF. Further information is available under Ways to Give.

#### **Qualified Charitable Distributions Form & IRA**

A qualified charitable distribution (QCD) is a direct transfer of stock or cash from an eligible IRA to a qualifying charity like the Library Foundation. When you make a QCD, the distribution is excluded from your taxable income, unlike a typical IRA withdrawal. The donation may keep you in a lower tax bracket, and it can be counted toward your IRA's required minimum distribution (RMD) for that tax year. You can give any amount up to a maximum of \$105,000 in 2024. This gift option is often called the IRA charitable rollover. Donors must be at least 70 ½ when they make the QCD.

#### **Gifts of Real Estate**

The Library Foundation has partnered with Realty Gift Fund to provide the option of gifts of real estate. Realty Gift fund is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization that accepts gifts of real estate and converts them to cash. It uses the net proceeds to make grants to nonprofit charities. You can also use a gift of real estate to fund a Donor Advised Fund or family foundation. With a gift or real estate, you will get a charitable income tax deduction equal to the property's full fair market value. You also avoid paying capital gains taxes on the sale of the property. The Foundation has a detailed FAQ about gifts of real estate and the Realty Gift Fund under the Ways to Give tab.

#### **Digital or Cryptocurrency**

The Foundation partners with the nonprofit organization every.org to accept gifts of cryptocurrency. Every.org accepts the digital currency, issues the proper IRS documentation to you, converts the currency to dollars, and transmits the funds to the Foundation. You receive a tax deduction for the full price of the currency at the time of the gift through every.org

#### Legacy and Estate Gifts

Bequests are nearly 10% of all contributions to charitable nonprofits in the United States. Leaving a legacy or estate gift to the Foundation does not need to be complicated. In fact, one of the easiest ways you can contribute a planned gift to the Library Foundation is by leaving a portion of your estate to the Foundation by naming it in your will or trust. You can reduce the amount of your estate tax by specifying a percentage of your estate, designating the Library Foundation as a beneficiary on your life insurance policy, donating a block of stock, or simply contributing a fixed sum of money. The Library Foundation will also benefit from being named a beneficiary in a Charitable Gift Annuity or Charitable Remainder Trust. It is always appropriate to consult with your professional advisors when considering an estate gift. ## FREEWILL

The Library Foundation is committed to promoting financial literacy, which is the reason that we sponsor the Financial Literacy Workshops, It's Your Money and It's Your Estate. The 12 workshops, six in the fall and six in the spring, are free and offer objective financial education.
