The Newport Beach Public Library Foundation and the City of Newport Beach celebrated the completion of the first phase of construction on Witte Hall, the state-of-the-art, 299-seat civic auditorium, slated to open in early 2026.





On Wednesday, September 25, 2024, the Newport Beach Public Library Foundation held its annual Library Leadership Reception in the Bamboo Courtyard and Friends Room. Invited to speak was Will O'Neill, the mayor of Newport Beach, concluding his eight years on the City Council at the end of 2024. His presentation, which may aptly be called "Look for the Helpers", was an important call for the significance of libraries and the importance of volunteerism.

Thank you to the Newport Beach Public Library Foundation for inviting me tonight.

Some of you heard me quote Eric Klinenberg's book about social infrastructure called Palaces for the People at the groundbreaking for Witte Hall.

One quote from the book is particularly important for tonight: "Libraries are the kinds of places where ordinary people with different backgrounds, passions, and interests can take part in a living democratic culture. They are the kinds of places where the public, private and philanthropic sectors can work together to reach for something higher than the bottom line."

Tonight is a convergence of those three sectors in one.

That is no small matter in a world filled with echo chambers and base political desires to tear down institutions. In my eight years on the City Council and two terms as Mayor, I have come to believe that the local city may end up being one of the last trusted institutions in our political system. Our federal and even state governments feel too insular and distant for the normal person to reach or change.

The city's role is both a philosophical issue as much as it is a social one. Leo Strauss wrote a fairly dense book titled Natural Right and History in which he noted that a "city, one may say, is a community in which everyone knows, not indeed every other member, but at least an acquaintance of every other member. A society meant to make man's perfection possible must be kept together by mutual trust, and trust presupposes acquaintance. Without such trust, the classics thought, there cannot be freedom; the alternative to the city, or a federation of cities, was the despotically ruled empire (headed, if possible, by a deified ruler) or a condition approaching anarchy. A city is a community commensurate with man's natural powers of firsthand or direct knowledge."

The city, and more specifically a well-run city, is indeed the antidote to despotism on the one extreme and anarchy on the other. And as a community of individuals, it remains important to remember words of a local author named David Bahnsen, who noted that "the crisis of individual responsibility is not going to be fixed by government policy."



That crisis, Bahnsen explains, creates a cascading effect. "Inadequate self-government begins the vicious cycle of creating the need for a more intrusive magistrate, leading to a more dependent people, leading to still greater government, leading to even less self-government, and resulting in even greater state expansion."

Striving for higher moral virtue as individuals is therefore not simply an individual imperative. It is a responsibility to the classical society meant to make man's perfection possible. An influence that we see in our nation's founding document, the United States Constitution, which begins with the classic preamble: "We the People of the United States, in Order to form a more perfect Union...."

We are able to debate, discuss, and explore theories about this world and worlds left to explore thanks to cultural centers like the public library. When the designers of Charles Lindbergh's Spirit of St. Louis had no idea how far New York was from Paris by the circle route, they went to their public library and measured the distances on a globe with a piece of string. When Ray Bradbury needed quiet from writing at home with his wife and four daughters, he rented a typewriter for ten cents an hour in the basement of UCLA's Powell Library. Over the course of nine days, he finished "The Fireman" and spent \$9.80 on the typewriter rental. That book would later be renamed Fahrenheit 451.

So as we gather tonight to celebrate ways that we can help, I'd simply like to reflect on our city's ongoing mission to Look For The Helpers. This theme derives from an interview that Mr. Rogers gave where he explained: "When I was a boy and I would see scary things in the news, my mother would say to me, 'Look for the helpers. You will always find people who are helping.' To this day, especially in times of disaster, I remember my mother's words, and I am always comforted by realizing that there are still so many helpers—so many caring people in this world."

We have the ability to do good in this world – to be Helpers – and I am glad to be a part of this collective effort tonight. Thank you and God bless you and the City of Newport Beach.



THREE THINGS IN LIFE I AM MOST PROUD OF

THE FAMILY I WAS BORN AND RAISED IN

I am blessed with the family I come from and the values both my parents passed down to me. I am the eldest of seven, two girls and five boys, and I am proud of how, with all of us having different personalities, we have been able to navigate through our relationships with each other, being respectful, not judgmental, supportive, and above else loving each other despite our differences. We've worked things out even when the circumstances were sensitive and complex. When I look around and see whole families broken due to disagreements, it leaves me heartbroken. I can't even imagine being in that scenario. I am confident that all my family members will be there for each other, no matter what.

THE BALANCE I ACHIEVED BETWEEN MY WORK AND MY OWN FAMILY

Back in the day, when I became a Mom, my priority was taking care of my children. I loved being a Family Doctor and was very committed to my work. While in my practice, I worked hard, volunteered for whatever came up, and was devoted to my patients. My job entailed an ongoing education during my career, so I had to spend a lot of time studying at home to stay ahead of the curve. My husband also had a demanding job, and he used to leave early in the morning and return home at night. So I couldn't count on him to take care of our kids or the house chores. As the most important thing to me was raising my children by their side, I had to refuse good job opportunities that implied working until night, at least while they were toddlers and little kids. I didn't want them to attend a nursery; I'd instead take them to kindergarten at the age of three. So, we used to spend a lot of time at the park socializing with other kids their age and in the playground. They loved "bath time," it was like a party, the bath full of small toys, splashing water all around, but at the same time, very relaxing. After they had dinner, I put them to bed and read a children's book, Winnie the Pooh was one of their favorites. Then I tucked them in, gave them a goodnight kiss, and had a moment for myself.

As they grew up, it was easier to work other shifts, and the options became broader. I have never regretted prioritizing my children over my job. It brought me more joy and upsides than downsides. Bringing up my kids filled me with priceless experiences and feelings. I take pride in working it out so that I could take care of my children and my work simultaneously.

BEING ABLE TO TOUCH SOMEONE'S LIFE THROUGH MY WORK AS A DOCTOR



Working as a Family Doctor has been one of the best things in my life. I remember back in the day when I had to choose my specialty. Everybody was telling me to pick others instead of Family Medicine. Being a Cardiologist, Dermatologist, Surgeon—you name it—was "cooler." But to me, being a Doctor means taking care of the whole person, including their body, mind, and soul. I don't conceive it any other way. I believe in a holistic approach to well-being and illness. I never hesitated; I knew that was my best and only option and what would make me happy. Being a Family Doctor was where I could thrive, be the best version of myself, and help others. I take pride in staying true to myself and going ahead with my decision against other's opinions.

One of the best gifts I have received at my work came from a patient; she was a middle-aged woman overcoming breast cancer, and she told me this: "Thank you for being just like you are: you have been a medicine, not only for my body but for my soul." Those simple words will stay with me forever.



Unlocking the Genetic Code: The Revolutionary Impact of CRISPR Technology

Grant MacGregor D.Phil / Professor – Charles Dunlop School of Biological Sciences, UCI

Dr. MacGregor will present an overview of current CRISPR-based

Dr. Grant MacGregor earned his D.Phil. from Sussex University. FUNDING THE FOUNDATION

The Library Foundation accepts contributory support in a variety of ways. As you make philanthropic plans for your contribution to the Foundation, consider options other than a cash contribution. Of course, we recommend that you consult with your attorney or tax advisor to find the most beneficial means of contributing to the Foundation. There is full information on the Foundation's website NBPLF. Foundation under the Ways to Give tab. **https://nbplf.foundation/give/** Consider the following options.

Donor Advised Funds

A Donor-Advised Fund (DAF) is like your own charitable savings account. You contribute to the fund as frequently as you like and then recommend grants to nonprofits like the Library Foundation, while potentially earning immediate tax benefits. If you are a client of Fidelity Charitable, Schwab Charitable, or BNY Mellon you can easily make a designation through the DAF Direct window on the Foundation website. If your DAF is with another charitable fund or trust, contact your financial advisor or trust administrator for details.

Digital or Cryptocurrency

The Library Foundation accepts contributions of digital or crypto currency through the nonprofit organization every.org. Every.org accepts the digital currency, issues IRS documentation to you, converts the currency to dollars and transmits it to the Foundation. You receive a tax deduction for the full price of the currency at the time of the gift through every.org.

Retirement Plan Contributions— The IRA Charitable Rollover

A special opportunity for those 70½ years old and older is the Qualified Charitable Distribution. You can give any amount (up to a maximum of \$100,000 per year) from your IRA directly to a qualified charity such as the Library Foundation without having to pay income taxes on the money. This popular gift option is commonly called the IRA charitable rollover, but you may also see it referred to as a qualified charitable distribution, or QCD for short.

Stock Transfers

The Foundation accepts shares of stock which are sold upon receipt and directed to the Annual Fund, Endowment Fund, the Beyond Books capital campaign for Witte Hall or other programs in accordance with your designation. To donate shares of stock, the Foundation website has specific directions for your broker.

Credit Card and ACH

If you are contributing by credit card, the Foundation recommends you do so through the secure giving page on our website. You also have the option of contributing directly from your checking account through the ACH option on that page. There is also a downloadable form if you want to send your contribution through the mail, or you can use the return envelope enclosed in this Bookmark.

Gifts of Real Estate

The Library Foundation has partnered with Realty Gift Fund to provide the option of gifts of real estate. Realty Gift Fund is a 501(c) (3) nonprofit organization that promotes the charitable giving of real estate by accepting real estate gifts, remediating assets for market, converting them to cash and using the net proceeds to make grants to non-profit organizations for current and planned gifts. You can also use a gift of real estate to fund a Donor Advised Fund or family foundation.

Legacy Giving

Legacy giving, often referred to as planned gifts such as bequests or charitable trusts, ensures the Library Foundation's financial stability and support for the Newport Beach Public Library for the long term. Planned giving allows you to leave a lasting legacy and can be particularly appealing to those who want to make a significant impact but may not have the means to do so during their lifetime. There are important tax advantages for donors making a planned gift, an option for those looking to manage their estates efficiently. The Foundation's Financial Literacy Workshops this Spring, It's Your Estate, examines estate planning and the option of legacy giving. The Elizabeth and John Stahr Legacy Society was established to honor those who have notified the Foundation that it has been included in their estate planning.

If you have already included the Library Foundation in your legacy planning, please let us know so that we can include you in The Elizabeth and John Stahr Legacy Society. You can use the secure form on the Foundation's website to notify us.

<u>FREEWILL</u>

As part of the Library Foundation's commitment to financial literacy, we are offering the FreeWill service to the community. FreeWill is an online tool to simplify the estate planning process. You can create a legally valid will online at no cost, providing peace of mind and security for what you hold dear. We hope that you will include the Library Foundation in your legacy planning, but our goal is for Library patrons to create your estate plan whether you include the Library Foundation or not.

Not only are the Foundation's Board members leaders in the community, but also many current and former directors are published authors.



Walter Stahr practiced law for over twenty years, both in Washington and Asia, before starting work on his first book, a biography of John Jay. He is now the NY Times bestselling author of four biographies: John Jay: Founding Father (2005), Seward: Lincoln's Indispensable Man (2012), Stanton: Lincoln's War Secretary (2017) and Salmon P. Chase: Lincoln's Vital Rival (2022). He is working on a fifth book, a life of William Howard Taft. Walter presented his book on Salmon P. Chase at Library Live in February 2022.



Megan Gorman, a tax attorney and wealth manager, is the newly published author of *All the Presidents' Money: How the Men Who Governed America Governed Their Money.* The book looks at the personal money stories of the presidents and some of the different ways that presidents over the last 250 years have made (or lost) money. Megan is also the host of the podcast "The Wealth Intersection."



Karen Heath Clark, a retired attorney and historian, is the author of two books. *Bill Clinton: America's Bridge to the 21st Century* is part of a series of presidential biographies. Nova Science Publishers sought Karen out for her exceptional knowledge and expertise to be the writer of the book Bill Clinton recently signed for her. *Mediterranean Summers: How a Man, a Woman and a Dog Spent Eight Summers Exploring the Ancient Sea in a Small Boat* presents the memorable adventures she and her husband, Bruce, pursued. The Library hosted her for an author lecture on both books.



Adrian Windsor is the author of five books in three genres: Inspirational – Seven Tools to Transform Genius into Practical Power, Get Off the Hamster Wheel: The New Moon Method to Reset, Reboot, and Replant, and Soul Searching: Meditations to Nourish and Connect; Memoir – Maiden Ladies, stories of Adrian's women teachers who chose calling over marriage; Fiction – The Butcher from McGregor about the life of a notorious Canadian rogue who lived on the edge of the law.



Patricia Adelman Dreyfus is a poet, writer, and editor who won The Laura Award for her short story "*The Homestead*" and the Anderbo Poetry Prize. Her latest poem is "*Forbearance*."



Former Board member **Gordon McAlpine** had his most recent novel, *After Oz*, published posthumously. It is a murder mystery about Dorothy's fantastical stories about her adventure in Oz, leading to the town suspecting her of murdering a local spinster. McAlpine was the Edgar Award-nominated author of the literary mystery novels *Holmes Entangled*, *Woman with a Blue Pencil*, and *Hammett Unwritten*, as well as other acclaimed novels and non-fiction.

FOUNDATION CHAIR'S ANNUAL REPORT

Fiscal Year 2024 was a year of great accomplishments for the Library Foundation. Critical milestones were reached and successfully met.

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN COMMITMENT

The City of Newport Beach sent out the new bids for the library lecture hall, now known as Witte Hall, named by the lead contribution from William Witte and Keiko Sakamoto. When the bids were returned, the cost of construction had more than doubled to \$23.5 million, requiring the Foundation to amend the original Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) of March 2022 to accept the responsibility to increase its fundraising commitment by over 60% to nearly \$12 million. Because of the Foundation's longstanding commitment to the Library and to the Newport Beach community's need for a library lecture hall/civic auditorium, the Foundation's Board of Directors accepted that challenge. In January 2024, when the City Council approved the Third Amendment to the MOU and accepted the construction bid from AMG Construction, the Foundation transmitted contributions of \$7.1 million to the City to an escrow account to begin construction.

GROUND-BREAKING

Then on February 27, the ceremonial ground-breaking event occurred. Naming Recognition Donors, Bill Witte, Keiko Sakamoto, and Elizabeth Stahr, were joined by City Council members, Library Trustees, Design Committee members, and our Board members. They took spade in hand and dug into the soil of the future footprint of Witte Hall. You can see the weekly progress of the construction on the Witte Hall page of our website https://nbplf.foundation/wittehall/. Site preparation is now complete, the structural beams are up, and as noted on page 12 of this Bookmark, the topping-off beam will soon be lifted into place. We eagerly await the opportunity to welcome the first audience into the Hall in January 2026.

BEYOND BOOKS

In January 2024, the Board restructured the capital campaign for Witte Hall, Beyond Books, and initiated its very public phase to fund 50% of the costs for Witte Hall. As of this writing, we are over 86% towards our goal. We appreciate your critical support. Witte Hall will be architecturally striking, acoustically excellent, fully ADA compliant with assistive listening, offering comfortable seating with great sightlines. It will be utilized by not just the Library and Foundation, but also by a great many community organizations. The Hall will be full and lively.

PROGRAM OFFERINGS

The 2023-2024 program season of the Foundation was sterling. The Witte Lecture Series and Library Live were sold out for every presentation with excellent speakers and audiences delighted with their expertise and insights. The new free series, Spotlight on Science, informed full houses on Artificial Intelligence and its use in scientific research, from large data models, to melting glaciers, to beach erosion. We learned how scientists use AI to spur discovery and identify solutions. The other free community programs—Medicine in Our Backyard, Financial Literacy Workshops, and the Book Discussion Group-increased their audiences to over pre-pandemic levels.

ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE

Structurally, the Board approved other transitions. The Lecture Hall Committee became part of the Development Committee once Phase Two of the campaign was entered. The Board approved a new investment management policy and investment manager and contracted a new auditing firm. We are pleased that our audit, as always, was very positive. The audit, and the Foundation's IRS reporting Form 990, are posted on our website under the Financial Responsibility tab for anyone to review. The Foundation has a Platinum rating from the national nonprofit rating site, Candid, and received a Four-Star rating from Charity Navigator. Our online giving platform and the Foundation's website have passed all security standards.

LEADERSHIP TRANSITION

It has been my honor to serve the Library and the Library Foundation as a Board member and officer for the past seven years. The Foundation is financially sound with significant reserves. Community leaders continue to accept positions as Board members and committee members. The Board members are engaged in governing the organization with unanimity of purpose, proud to be part of an organization that helps to make a good library a Great Library. Marilyn Krahe, our current Vice Chair, will assume the position of Chair, and I will continue to serve as Vice-Chair for the next Fiscal Year.

APPRECIATION

We appreciate your continued support as Foundation Members and as ticket purchasers to the Witte Lectures and Library Live. We appreciate your attendance at our free programs: Medicine in Our Backyard, Financial Literacy Workshops, Spotlight on Science, and the Book Discussion Group. Your participation demonstrates the Library Foundation's relevance as an important partner of the Newport Beach Public Library. I urge you to continue your support, increase it if possible, and encourage your family, friends, and colleagues to join you in that support.

PROGRAMS

The Foundation presented 48 programs in the 2023-2024 season, 32 of which were free for the community. Free programs included Medicine in Our Backyard, the Financial Literacy Workshops, Book Discussion Group, and the new initiative, Spotlight on Science. The total attendance for the programs presented by the Foundation was over 4,600.

In response to the high demand for Foundation programs, we launched season passes for the Witte Lecture Series. We were delighted to report that over half of the attendees held season passes. Given this success, we are also planning to implement season passes for our Library Live Author Series.

WITTE DISTINGUISHED AUTHOR SERIES

The 27th season of the Witte Lectures kicked off with a SOLD-OUT event featuring Fiona Hill, Former US National Security Council senior director for European and Russian affairs. Over 1,600 people attended the Winter-Spring 2024 Witte Lecture Series. Audience members were enthused to be able to attend compelling presentations by:

- Fiona Hill, Former US National Security Council senior director for Russian affairs on and author of *There Is Nothing for You Here: Finding Opportunity in the 21st Century* was in conversation with Walter Stahr, author of Salmon P. Chase
- Ed Yong, author of An Immense World, spoke on *The Amazing Nature* of Animal Senses
- Richard Reeves, author of Boys and Men: Why the Modern Male is Struggling, why it Matters, and What to Do About it
- Dahlia Lithwick MSNBC legal analyst and author of Lady Justice was in conversation with Michele Goodwin, professor of constitutional law and global health policy at Georgetown Law School, about the 2022-2023 Term of Supreme Court: What Has Happened and What is to Come

LIBRARY LIVE

Library Live proudly showcased Californian authors who discussed a variety of topics, including a 15th-century Chinese women physician, retirement advice, and navigating the next chapter in life. They also shared a journalist's harrowing experience of being kidnapped by Somali pirates, alongside a poignant contemporary tale of loneliness and longing. The speakers were:

SPOTLIGHT ON SCIENCE

The Library Foundation initiated a new free program that focuses on innovative and exciting scientific research, utilizing extraordinary and renowned scientists from our local universities. This season theme was Artificial Intelligence (AI). The speakers were:

- Eric Rignot, PhD and Isabella Velicogna, PhD, spoke on Tracking Ice and Water in a Changing Climate with AI
- Brett Sanders, PhD, spoke on Digital Tools for Projecting Coastal Erosion and Flooding

MEDICINE IN OUR BACKYARD

Through the Library Foundation's partnership with UCI Health and the support of Mike and Polly Smith, Medicine in Our Backyard engaged internationally renowned UCI medical faculty to address a broad range of health issues: managing pain, mental health in adults, technology for healthy health, preserving eyesight, women's heart health, colon cancer, aging and the lower spine, and antibiotics. As many as 150 people registered for these free lectures, each ending with a wide-ranging Q & A exchange with the audience.

FINANCIAL LITERACY WORKSHOPS

The Financial Literacy Workshops started in September and continue to see an increase in participation. The workshops are free programs presented by the Library Foundation for the public. Financial Literacy presents It's Your Money Series in the Fall and It's Your Estate workshops in the Spring. Each series has six workshops.

BOOK DISCUSSION GROUP

This free program continues to see a significant increase in participation. Participants in the Discussion Group, moderated and led by Director of Programs Kunga Wangmo, suggest books to read and discuss, and then Kunga Wangmo curates the suggestions and includes the works by the Library Live authors who will speak on that series for the season. Book Discussion Group begins in September and ends in May for nine sessions.

VIDEOS

Due to licensing restrictions, videos of the Witte Lecture and Library Live series are available on the Foundation's website only for members of the Foundation. Medicine in Our Backyard and Spotlight on Science videos are always available for free to everyone on the Foundation's website.

MEMBER EVENTS

The season opened with the annual Library Leadership Reception in the Bamboo Courtyard, celebrating those Foundation donors that make generous annual contributions to fund the Witte Lectures, Library Live, and other Foundation programs as well as providing support for the Foundation's support of the Newport Beach Library. As you walk along the portico in front of the Central Library you will see tiles with the names of those that have made leadership contributions over the past 31 years.


The season ended with a Summer Solstice Reception in the Bamboo Courtyard celebrating new members of the Foundation, Library Leadership Circle donors, and distinguished guests. In June, the Foundation hosted the Kids Marketplace in support of the Beyond Books Witte Hall civic auditorium project. The Kids Marketplace raised funds and awareness for the construction of Witte Hall, the new 10,000-square-foot, 299-seat civic auditorium currently under construction.
