


THE ROLE OF LIBRARIES

One way to think about libraries is as collections of books that serve readers. This is the first way in which most of us encounter and enjoy libraries. Another way to think about libraries, however, is as the factories in which new books are created. I have become more aware of this second role in my second career, as the author of several biographies.

For me, writing a single book requires reading or at least skimming two or three hundred other books, often on odd topics, like the role of the KKK in American politics in the early twentieth century. In some cases, I purchase books, but more often I read the books at a library. Here in Southern California, the libraries on which I rely include the Newport Beach Public Library, the UCI Library, and the Huntington Library. Further afield, I have worked in about a hundred different libraries over the years, from Maine to Florida to Ohio to Illinois to California.

Often the key library is not some massive place like the Library of Congress but a small public library. For my William Henry Seward project, for example, some of the most interesting letters were in metal filing cabinets in the basement of the public library in Goshen, New York. The only copies of some papers about Seward's first political campaign were in public libraries in upstate New York. For my Salmon P. Chase biography, a key collection was at the public library of Redlands, California, which had inherited a set of photocopies of Chase correspondence.

In some cases, a book or collection is available online. For my current project, a life of William Howard Taft, the million pages of the Taft collection at the Library of Congress are available online. They are only available, however, because the papers themselves are in the Library and because librarians have scanned and sorted and posted them. So, when I am reading the letters among the Taft papers, I am effectively relying upon a library.

Many older books are now available online through services like Hathitrust. This means that I do not have to go as often as I once did to the Rare Book Room at the Library of Congress. But again, these books do not just appear online by magic. Hathitrust is a collaborative effort of several libraries to identify and scan and organize older books. So, when I read part of a book on Hathitrust, I am again relying upon a library.

I know enough about the way in which other biographers and historians work to say that they rely like me upon libraries.

And even those who write fiction, at least if they write about some period other than the present, rely upon libraries. How can one write a thrilling fictional account of naval life during the Napoleonic Wars without reading books about that period? Indeed, writing such a book would require reading the original accounts of naval voyages, and one would find those accounts in libraries.

There is another sense, less tangible but perhaps no less important, in which libraries not only store books but make books. I suspect most books start when the author is reading some other book and has a moment of inspiration—a glimpse of some other book that he or she could write. Toni Morrison, for example, read in 1974 a newspaper clipping from 1856 about the murder by Margaret Garner of her daughter. Garner explained in the article that she had killed her child and attempted to kill two more because she would rather they died free (they had escaped from Kentucky to Ohio) than return to life in slavery. I do not know whether Morrison was literally in a library when she first read that clipping—I suspect she was because there were no online newspaper databases in 1974. We know however that the clipping was the genesis of the novel Beloved and that the clipping would not have existed if the paper in question had not been saved and shared by some library.

So, the next time you step through the doors of the Newport Beach Public Library, think of yourself as being not merely in a wonderful world of books, but in a factory in which yet more books are being made, to provide reading pleasure for years to come.

Walk into the Central Library main entrance and look at the wall of names on your left. Those names are the community of givers that saw a need for a great library in Newport Beach. It is not hyperbole to say that those names would not be there without the grand lady that we lost on April 29. Elizabeth Stahr and her husband John knew that they could call on the families, children, and businesses of Newport Beach to raise not only their voices in support of a major library but also open their pocketbooks to help fund the construction.



Elizabeth's son Walter is a member of the Library Foundation Board of Directors, and he recalls that his mother wrote a thank you letter for every gift and made sure it was mailed even before the check was deposited. Every donor was important to her no matter the size of their contribution, every gift to be celebrated.

Elizabeth loved children and took great joy in their learning. The children's area of the Central Library is the Stahr Children's Room, and daily scores of children enter the room below that sign to roam the stacks, hear stories and sing songs during Storytime, grab a book (and often many, many books), and even watch in awe as caterpillars become butterflies and larvae transform into ladybugs. Elizabeth loved coming to watch Storytime and the look of joy in her



eyes as she watched the children will be treasured by all. Her greatest legacy is not this building, but the generations of children that will discover the world around them through reading books.

For the 30th anniversary of the opening of the Central Library, Elizabeth's daughter Gretchen brought her mom to the Library. Elizabeth walked toward the Stahr Children's Room, looked up at the sign and smiled. I am sure she was remembering the day the Central Library opened and all the kids that rushed in to see this magical new space.

Elizabeth was known for her support of the Girl Scouts, Pacific Orchestra Youth Symphony, AFS-USA—children learning, children exploring, children fostering creativity; Elizabeth's children number not just four, but thousands.

Knowing how important it is for the community to gather and to learn from others and from each other, Elizabeth made a major contribution to the Beyond Books Campaign for the new library lecture hall, Witte Hall. The redesigned courtyard will be named the Stahr Courtyard.


U.S.- China Tensions — Past, Present, and Future Friday, February 27, 7:00pm | Saturday, February 28, 2:00pm

Dr. Julian Gewirtz served in the Biden administration as Senior Director for China and Taiwan Affairs at the National Security Council (NSC), Senior Advisor to the Principal Deputy National Security Advisor, and as Deputy China Coordinator at the State Department.

Gewirtz is the author of three books including Never Turn Back: China and the Forbidden History of the 1980s, which was named the best book of the year by Foreign Affairs and BBC History, and the Making of Global China and Your Face My Flag: Poems. He was previously Senior Fellow for China Studies at the Council on Foreign Relations, Lecturer in History at Harvard University and Columbia University.

Gewirtz was recently named one of "50 people shaping our society" by the *Washington Post*. He received his doctoral degree in modern Chinese history from Oxford University, where he was a Rhodes Scholar, and his undergraduate degree from Harvard College.




Pippa Malmgren

An economist, author, and economic advisor to President George W. Bush, Pippa Malmgren is known for her expertise in global financial markets and geopolitics. Credited with coining the term "shrinkflation," she provides insights on emerging trends, technology, and risks shaping the global economy.

She served President George W. Bush in the White House as special assistant to the president and on The National Economic Council. After 9/11, she was also responsible for assessing terrorism risks to the economy and technology as a source of geopolitical competitiveness. Malmgren is the author of five books, including *Geopolitics for Investors* and *The Leadership Lab*. Her most recent bestseller, *The Infinite Leader*, won the International Press Award for the Best Book on Leadership. She serves as a judge on The Queen's Enterprise Business Awards and was a member of the Board of Directors for The Department for International Trade in the UK. She is a Senior Associate Fellow of the Royal United Services Institute, a defense and security think tank in London




Ruth Ben-Ghiat

Strongmen: Mussolini to the Present Friday, May 1, 7:00pm | Saturday, May 2, 2:00pm

Ruth Ben-Ghiat is Professor of History at New York University. She writes about fascism, authoritarianism, propaganda, and the threats these present to democracies around the world. Her most recent book, the New York Times bestseller Strongmen: Mussolini to the Present (2021), looks at how illiberal leaders use propaganda, corruption, violence, and machismo, and how they can be defeated. She is the recipient of Guggenheim, and Fulbright fellowships.

Ben-Ghiat's insights into the authoritarian playbook and democracy protection, and her ability to explain complex issues clearly and succinctly, have made her an expert source around the globe. She writes for *The New York Times*, *The Economist, The Washington Post*, and *The Atlantic*, and provides live commentary for CNN, France 24, MSNBC, and other networks. She has appeared in many documentaries about dictators and threats to democracy, such as Netflix's *How to Become a Tyrant* and PBS's *The Dictators' Playbook*. Ben-Ghiat served as a historical consultant for Guillermo del Toro's Oscarwinning *Pinocchio*, which is set in Fascist Italy, and the Netflix docuseries *Hitler and the Nazis: Evil on Trial*.


Susan Straight






Anthony Doerr

From Molecules to Mankind: Tracing Life's Origins

Irene Chen / Professor — Department of Chemical and Biomolecular Engineering, UCLA Wednesday, October 8, 2025, 7:00pm

Doors open at 6:30pm

The origin of life is a captivating scientific mystery that has intrigued researchers for centuries. It refers to the process by which life began on Earth, transitioning from simple organic molecules to complex living organisms. Dr. Chen will

provide insight into how life may have originated; its processes as well as the latest findings from asteroid Bennu by NASA's OSIRIS-REx spacecraft which was packed with life's building blocks.

Dr. Chen is a professor in the Department of Chemical and Biomolecular Engineering at the University of California, Los Angeles. She received a B.A. in chemistry and an M.D.-Ph.D. in biophysics from Harvard. She has received the Searle Scholar award, NIH New Innovator award, and the David White award for outstanding contribution in astrobiology. She has been a Simons Investigator for the Collaboration on the Origin of Life since 2013.

Doug Finke will take on this daunting topic and make it more approachable for us to understand by exploring the basics of quantum computing, its progress and application.

Finke is the Chief Content Officer of Global Quantum Intelligence (GQI) and the Managing Editor of the Quantum Computing Report by GQI, which he founded in 2015 as the first news and analysis website dedicated to quantum technology. He holds degrees in computer engineering and management from the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign and MIT, respectively, and holds eight patents in the field of computer technology.



Miniature Space: The Future of Small Satellites

Dr. Charles D. Norton is the Deputy Chief Technologist at NASA JPL/Caltech responsible for JPL's technology strategic planning, research, and infusion into flight missions. Dr. Norton is the Special Advisor for Small Spacecraft Missions at NASA HQ. In that role he is responsible for advising NASA's cross-agency strategic direction for innovative small satellite science, exploration, and technology missions from ESPA-Class spacecraft down to CubeSats. Previously, he was a Principal Technologist and Program Manager Associate at JPL where he developed and led multiple small spacecraft missions. Charles is a recipient of numerous awards for new technology and innovation, including the JPL Lew Allen Award, Voyager Award, and the NASA Exceptional Service Medal.



Echoes from the Cosmos: Pioneering Contributions to Gravitational Wave Observation

Barry Barish, PhD / Distinguished Professor, Physics & Astronomy Department, University of California, Riverside Wednesday, May 6, 2026, 7:00pm

Dr. Barry Barish received the 2017 Nobel Prize in Physics for his pivotal role in the LIGO (Laser Interferometer Gravitational-Wave Observatory) detector and the observation of gravitational waves, sharing the honor with Rainer Weiss

and Kip S. Thorne. He began his career in high-energy physics, making significant contributions at Stanford and Fermilab. In 1994, Barish became the principal investigator for LIGO, implementing necessary design changes and establishing the LIGO Scientific Collaboration to involve more scientists. Construction of LIGO's interferometers began in 1994, with observations starting in 2002. After years without detection, Advanced LIGO successfully detected gravitational waves on September 14, 2015.

SEASON WRAP-UP 2025

Thank you for attending the 2024-2025 program season with us. We presented and supported forty-seven (47) events this season with thirty-five (35) free to the community. This year's lineup displayed an exceptional variety of speakers covering relevant and timely topics. The 28th season of the Witte Lectures and 2024-2025 season of Library Live Author series were sold out events!

The feedback we received from participants was positive, with many expressing appreciations for the diverse topics and engaging discussions. A standout moment of the season was the Library Live event featuring the author of *Lessons in Chemistry*, Bonnie Garmus, who engaged in conversation with Judy Wu, UCI Director of the Humanities Center. This event, held outside on the Civic Center Green, attracted an audience of over 500.

Following this, we welcomed LA Times environmental journalist Rosanna Xia, who discussed her book *California Against the Sea: Visions for our Vanishing Coastline*. She shared insights from her investigation into rising sea levels and their effects on Southern California beaches and communities. Xia also provided a sneak preview of her documentary, "Out of Plain Sight," revealing the shocking discovery of up to half a million barrels of toxic waste dumped just off the Southern California coast. The third event featured author Javier Zamora in conversation with Programs Director Kunga Wangmo-Upshaw, where Zamora candidly recounted his harrowing journey as a 10 year-old undocumented immigrant to reunite with his family in the U.S. The season concluded with Pulitzer Prize winner Viet Thanh Nguyen, whose book *A Man of Two Faces* detailed

his family's experience fleeing Vietnam and pursuing the "American Dream" as refugees.

The Witte Season launched with sold-out lectures featuring New York Times columnist Bret Stephens, who addressed a wide array of pressing topics, including the Presidential election, immigration, and the Israel-Gaza conflict. In a similar vein, former Assistant Secretary at the Department of Homeland Security, Juliette Kayyem, along with Jacob Ware, an adjunct professor at Georgetown University's Edmund A. Walsh School of Foreign Service, explained how various governmental agencies assess and mitigate national security and climate risks, such as California's wildfires. M. Chris Fabricant, the Director of Strategic Litigation at the Innocence Project, provided a deep exploration of the American criminal justice system using one of his well-known cases as a reference. Providing a refreshing perspective, award-winning national sportswriter Christine Brennan offered an insightful discussion on the historical impact of Title IX and an exclusive preview of her forthcoming book, which examines the ascent of basketball player Caitlin Clark and the increasing prominence of women's college basketball.



BEYOND BOOKS CAMPAIGN UPDATE

When the Library Foundation's Board of Directors, wearing boots, hard hats, and safety vests, toured the construction site for Witte Hall, memories of the anxiety and struggle to bring a library lecture hall and civic auditorium to Newport Beach evaporated. Thanks to the leadership of Jill Johnson-Tucker, former library trustee and philanthropist, the skill and experience of Jerold D Kappel, Library Foundation CEO, the commitment of the Library Foundation Board, and the generous contributions of more than 200 donors, the impressive sight of the auditorium left the Board mesmerized.

For months, library visitors have observed the construction underway – the mounds of dirt, then structural steel, then the grid of waves to match the Civic Center roof, and now actual walls. None of this prepared the Board for the experience of the depth and grandeur of the actual space for 299 seats with its elevated stage, huge video screen, acoustic excellence, and welcoming lobby.

Witte Hall will transform the program experience of the Newport Beach community with Library Foundation lectures, Library presentations, Film Festival screenings, Sunday Musicales, and even local school performances. The uses for Witte Hall will go far "beyond" our expectations, as will the Stahr Courtyard that expands the Hall "beyond" its actual perimeters, accommodating a variety of activities.

The Stahr Courtyard is named for the late Elizabeth Stahr, who, along with her husband John, established the Library Foundation 31 years ago to advocate for and receive donations to support the construction of the Central Library, which last year was the second most visited site in Newport Beach after the Harbor and beaches. Jene Witte, widow of Martin Witte, established the Witte Distinguished Lecture Series in Martin's name 28 years ago. It continues to thrive and forms the model for the Foundation's exceptional programs: Library Live Distinguished Authors Series, Medicine in Our Backyard, Spotlight on Science, Financial Literacy Workshops, and the Book Discussion Group. Bill Witte, son of Martin Witte, and his wife Keiko Sakimoto, are major donors to Beyond Books, and celebrate the Witte legacy with the naming of Witte Hall. Once again, the Library Foundation, with its bond to the community, brings to Newport Beach a landmark dedicated to engaging learners, inspiring thinkers, and nurturing civic connections.

Beyond Books, the name the Foundation gave to its campaign to raise 50% of the cost of the \$24 million Hall, is near completion. "Beyond" is being delivered. The Grand Opening of Witte Hall, scheduled for the weekend of March 20-22, 2026, will kick off with a Grand Opening Gala Reception for donors of \$25,000 and above. The names of those donors will be memorialized on the Donor Wall in the Louise and Roy Woolsey Memorial Lobby. You still have time to take a hard-hat tour and be included on that roster. Due to the construction timeline, donor names must be submitted by November 15, 2025. However, if you sign a gift agreement by that date you can fulfill your commitment any time before the Witte Hall Grand Opening.

The weekend of the Grand Opening, being planned by the Library Foundation, Library staff, and the City's Recreation and Senior Services, includes children's events, a film on the Foundation-funded 11'-19' video wall, a Sunday Musicale, and a renowned speaker. Be on the watch for the schedule. 

The Foundation's Financial Literacy Workshops always highlight the importance of charitable intent when financial planning. However, like many nonprofit organizations, the Library Foundation has heard concerns from donors about how economic and market conditions may impact their continued support for the Foundation and its mission to support the Newport Beach Public Library. I asked Kevin Barlow, the Immediate Past Chair of the Foundation, and its former Treasurer, for his expectations on charitable giving for the next six months.

Don't let short term economic anxiety affect your longer-term charitable plans

In 2025, the U.S. stock market has experienced significant volatility, impacting both investor sentiment and charitable giving. The year began with optimism, as major indices like the S&P 500 and Nasdaq Composite reached record highs in early February. This upward trajectory was then abruptly interrupted in March when the Trump administration announced sweeping tariffs on imports. This announcement led to a sharp market downturn, with the S&P 500 entering correction territory in early April.

Despite the initial shock, the market rebounded in April and May after the administration paused the implementation of new tariffs. If you fell asleep on New Year's, then woke up at the beginning of June and looked at the market indices, it would almost seem like nothing had happened in the year so far—key market indices were within 1% of where they started the year.

How the economy and U.S. stock market perform in the second half of the year will likely be highly dependent on policy decisions. Currently, data in areas like corporate profits, profit margins and employment remain strong, but uncertainty over policy decisions—what will happen with the implementation of tariffs, federal reserve policy and the looming 2025 tax bill—affects both investors and donors alike. But, as recent economic data shows, the US economy has proven more resilient than many give it credit for.

This market volatility has had mixed effects on charitable giving. High-net-worth individuals continue to contribute significantly, with foundations projected to increase their giving by 5.3% in 2025, although anecdotal data shows these numbers may be too optimistic in the current environment. However, the broader donor base is facing challenges: Many have reduced their charitable donations due to increased living costs and economic uncertainty. Changes in projected government spending in several areas have also affected many nonprofit sources of funding. Nonprofit organizations—particularly those reliant on individual donations—are experiencing financial strain,

such as rising operational costs, as they navigate these economic headwinds. These increased expenses are not always offset by increased donations.

In short, nonprofit organizations are more reliant than ever on donations from high-net-worth individuals to achieve their missions.

A few ideas to consider:

- Market gains over the past decade have left many investors with significant unrealized gains in their taxable accounts. Donating appreciated stock—such as that high-performing technology holding—can benefit not only nonprofits, but also you, by providing significant tax benefits that help reduce both current and future tax liabilities.
- As of the end of 2024, over \$251 billion has been allocated to Donor Advised Funds, but hasn't yet reached operating nonprofits.* This money is already outside of donor's estates and the tax benefits have already been received. Consider recommending a contribution from your Donor Advised Fund to a nonprofit when the money is needed most.
- Don't let short term economic anxiety affect your longer-term charitable plans. Talk to the leaders of the organizations you support about how and when your funds can make the most impact.
