A MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR OF THE LIBRARY FOUNDATION OF NEWPORT BEACH

In this issue of Bookmark, you will also read about the 2026 changes to the Library Foundation's "Branding." The new tagline, "Supporting Discovery and Connection -Beyond Books," reflects our steadfast mission: to fund library resources, programs, and services, and to engage the community through literary, cultural, and intellectual opportunities. The Foundation serves as a vital partner to the Newport Beach Public Library. Over the past decade alone, the Foundation has contributed more than \$7 million to support programs, technology, and services for the 1.2 million annual users who visit our four library branches, the second most visited "venue" in Newport Beach after the harbor and beach. If you have not yet explored the Media Lab, Sound Lab, or checked out a Tech Toy, consider this your invitation. The Media Lab even offers a podcast-ready recording booth.

As Chair of the Library Foundation Board, I am honored to work alongside a team of professional, engaged, and deeply dedicated community leaders who volunteer countless hours on behalf of our Foundation. We could not accomplish our mission without their energy, passion, and commitment. My heartfelt thanks to each member of our Board for their contributions—both today and in the years ahead.

WHAT'S IN A BRAND?

In concert with the launching of the new Witte Hall, funded 50% by the Library Foundation's Beyond Books campaign, we are taking the opportunity to refresh and update the Foundation's overall brand, including our logo and brand statement.

An organization's brand is not just a graphical logo but is built upon a brand essence, or purpose that is an extension of the organization's mission. For example, Coca-Cola's brand essence might be described as "happiness, belonging, and joy," while Pepsi is closer to "youthful energy, excitement, and cultural relevance." In a rebranding, an organization has the opportunity to review its mission and corresponding brand, not only to refresh its look and feel but to steer the organization strategically forward while providing a framework to guide its priorities and actions.

The Foundation Board launched the effort earlier this year, and we are proud to introduce our new branding in advance of the Hall's opening and our planned opening festivities in 2026.

The objectives of the rebrand included modernizing the look and color palette and bringing in imagery that evokes our close affiliation with our amazing Library, which is consistently one of the only Four-Star libraries in all of California. After a round of interviews with various design agencies, we selected a joint effort between **Assume**

Nothing Studios + Brand Runner
Consulting to perform focused market
research, followed by an iterative design
presentation and review process with a
Board subcommittee.

Concurrently with this exercise, the Board assessed its existing brand statement, "The Foundation Helps Make Your Library Happen Every Day," against our evolving mission to expand and extend the Library's capabilities and programming.

Over the past years, we have directly funded significant improvements to the library infrastructure and technology (such as the Media Lab, e-books and the Tech Toys for Kids), while adding major new programs (such as Spotlight on Science) to our already extensive list: The Witte Lectures, Library Live, Medicine in Our Backyard, the Book Discussion Group, and the Financial Literacy Workshops. There was a need to provide clearer, more specific messages regarding what the Foundation does.

Three key areas add significant value:

- > Broadening the community's ability to explore and discover new things – ideas, technology, media skills;
- > Bringing the community together to learn, connect, and exchange ideas, and;
- > Providing resources beyond the library's primary printed or tangible assets.

Converting this into a new brand statement meant encapsulating these themes into an **action phrase** that emanates from the *mission*, which led to our new brand statement:

Supporting Discovery and Connection... Beyond Books

This statement not only helps guide our investments of time and resources but also communicates what we do for the community and for the Library – while paying homage to our highly successful "Beyond Books Campaign for Witte Hall."

THE LOGO

The inspiration behind our new logo was the ancient *Library of Alexandria*. According to the consultants, the Library of Alexandria "symbolized humanity's bold pursuit of universal knowledge, where books were not just stored, but revered as vessels of wisdom. Integrating this heritage into a modern brand signals a commitment to curiosity, preservation, and global dialogue. It positions the library as more than a quiet archive: it becomes a civic monument to learning, where past and future converge."

Cleverly incorporating the Newport Beach initials (NB) into a modernized book silhouette, the new logo was born! This three-book stack is both a standalone mark and incorporated into a bookshelf, showing the Foundation's connection to the library. A vibrant color brings energy and pop to the mark. See the new logo(s) below.

OUR NAME

Finally, but no less important, is a renaming of the Foundation from

The Newport Beach Public Library Foundation to The Library Foundation of Newport Beach.

Research revealed a common misperception that the Foundation functions as an internal division, rather than a standalone non-profit funded by private philanthropy. Our rebranding clearly establishes the Foundation as separate from but supportive of the Library.

The Foundation thanks the design team, the Branding subcommittee, and the Foundation Board for their time, passionate viewpoints, and support for this process!

BEYOND BOOKS CAMPAIGN FOR WITTE HALL

The campaign for Witte Hall is nearing its completion, and we look forward to celebrating its success early in 2026. The Library Foundation made a commitment to the City of Newport Beach to fund 50% of the cost of building Witte Hall, the Stahr Courtyard, and the infrastructure improvements that are part of that construction. That goal is \$11,750,000. In addition, the Foundation agreed to underwrite the cost of increasing the size of the high-definition video wall on the stage to 11'x19'. The increased size will provide greater flexibility for the use of Witte Hall for such programs as the Newport Beach Film Festival documentaries and short films. The Foundation sees the potential of adding science documentaries to the very popular Spotlight on Science program series, and the Library can plan for a literary film series for both adults and children. The cost to the Foundation of the video wall increase is \$130,000.

WITTE HALL GRAND OPENING

The Grand Opening Weekend of Witte Hall is planned for 2026. There will be a number of programs to introduce the Hall to the community. On Friday evening, the Library Foundation will salute its major donors to the Beyond Book Campaign with a special presentation in the Hall, opening reception in the Stahr Courtyard, and a post-event reception and dinner. On Saturday, there will be two children's programs during the day, and a documentary film presentation that evening. On Sunday, the Library will introduce music in the Hall with the highly acclaimed Sunday Musicale. All programs on Saturday and Sunday will be free, however, because of the anticipated demand, registrations are recommended to ensure a seat.

The Library Foundation will publish a program book for that weekend which will also cover all Library and Foundation programs scheduled for Witte Hall through June 30, 2027. Sponsorships for the weekend of events are available, as is advertising in the program booklet. A WITTE HALL CHAMPION

Many people involved in the Newport Beach Public Library as Trustees and staff, in the Library Foundation as Board members and volunteers, Newport Beach City Council members and leadership, and our wonderful Beyond Books donors, have advocated for a library lecture hall and civic auditorium for the greater Newport Beach community. You can see many of their names on the Foundation website and in this and past issues of Bookmark Magazine. However, every endeavour of this magnitude needs that one person who has the vision and the energy to tirelessly promote that vision to the community and its leaders.

To achieve something as wonderful as Witte Hall you need a champion. This Hall, and the Beyond Books Campaign, had such a champion—Jill Johnson-Tucker. As a Library Trustee she knew there was a need not just for the Newport Beach Public Library, but for the Newport Beach community, to



have a civic gathering place to engage and inspire generations of learners. A beautiful venue for lectures, music, film, and presentations to stimulate dialogue and to build community. Jill's enthusiasm and drive made her the perfect person to chair the City's Lecture Hall Design Committee. The stunning Witte Hall is a product of that committee, and the expertise and design philosophy of Robert R. Coffee Architect + Associates.

Jill knew that for the hall to be successful it needed to be a public/private partnership in which the community invested in its development. Jill joined the Board of the Library Foundation and chaired the campaign, now the Beyond Books Campaign, to raise the needed funds to convince the City leadership that the hall, then known as the Library Lecture Hall, would be backed by the community not just with their voices, but with their charitable investment. She chaired the campaign with a zeal, getting others to see the possibilities and the promise of what is now named Witte Hall and the Stahr Courtyard. There may be someone in Newport Beach that Jill has not encouraged to contribute, but that someone will be difficult to find.

Yes, every project needs a champion. Witte Hall has that champion.




Miniature Space: The Future of Small Satellites

Charles Norton, PhD / Deputy Chief Technologist at NASA Jet Propulsion Laboratory, California Institute of Technology Wednesday, April 15, 2026, 7:00pm

Dr. Charles D. Norton is the Deputy Chief Technologist at NASA JPL/ Caltech responsible for JPL's technology strategic planning, research, and infusion into flight missions. Dr. Norton is the Special Advisor for Small Spacecraft Missions at NASA HQ. In that role he is responsible for

advising NASA's cross-agency strategic direction for innovative small satellite science, exploration, and technology missions from ESPA-Class spacecraft down to CubeSats. Previously, he was a Principal Technologist and Program Manager Associate at IPL where he developed and led multiple small spacecraft missions. Charles is a recipient of numerous awards for new technology and innovation, including the IPL Lew Allen Award, Voyager Award, and the NASA Exceptional Service Medal.



Matter, Antimatter, and the Evolution of the Universe

Barry Barish, PhD / Distinguished Professor, Physics and Astronomy Department, University of California, Riverside Wednesday, May 6, 2026, 7:00pm

Dr. Barry Barish received the 2017 Nobel Prize in Physics for his pivotal role in the LIGO (Laser Interferometer Gravitational-Wave Observatory) detector and the observation of gravitational waves, sharing the honor with Rainer Weiss and Kip S. Thorne. He began

his career in high-energy physics, making significant contributions at Stanford and Fermilab. In 1994, Barish became the principal investigator for LIGO, implementing necessary design changes and establishing the LIGO Scientific Collaboration to involve more scientists. Construction of LIGO's interferometers began in 1994, with observations starting in 2002. After years without detection, Advanced LIGO successfully detected gravitational waves on September 14, 2015.


Colm Tóibín




Julian Gewirtz

U.S.- China Tensions — Past, Present, and Future Friday, February 27, 7:00pm | Saturday, February 28, 2:00pm

Dr. Julian Gewirtz served in the Biden administration as Senior Director for China and Taiwan Affairs at the National Security Council (NSC), Senior Advisor to the Principal Deputy National Security Advisor, and as Deputy China Coordinator at the State Department.

Gewirtz is the author of three books including Never Turn Back: China and the Forbidden History of the 1980s, which was named the best book of the year by Foreign Affairs and BBC History, and the Making of Global China and Your Face My Flag: Poems. He was previously Senior Fellow for China Studies at the Council on Foreign Relations, Lecturer in History at Harvard University and Columbia University.

Gewirtz was recently named one of "50 people shaping our society" by the Washington Post. He received his doctoral degree in modern Chinese history from Oxford University, where he was a Rhodes Scholar, and his undergraduate degree from Harvard College.




Pippa Malmgren

International Relations and the Future of Global Economy Friday, March 27, 7:00pm | Saturday, March 28, 2:00pm

An economist, author, and economic advisor to President George W. Bush, Pippa Malmgren is known for her expertise in global financial markets and geopolitics. Credited with coining the term "shrinkflation," she provides insights on emerging trends, technology, and risks shaping the global economy.

She served President George W. Bush in the White House as special assistant to the president and on The National Economic Council. After 9/11, she was also responsible for assessing terrorism risks to the economy and technology as a source of geopolitical competitiveness. Malmgren is the author of five books, including *Geopolitics for Investors* and *The Leadership Lab*. Her most recent bestseller, *The Infinite Leader*, won the International Press Award for the Best Book on Leadership. She serves as a judge on The Queen's Enterprise Business Awards and was a member of the Board of Directors for The Department for International Trade in the UK. She is a Senior Associate Fellow of the Royal United Services Institute, a defense and security think tank in London.

One of the first women photographers to work for National Geographic, Annie Griffiths has photographed in more than 100 countries during her rich and varied career. She has worked on dozens of magazines and book projects for National Geographic. In addition to her editorial work, Annie is deeply committed to using photography to support aid organizations. She is the Founder of Ripple Effect Images, a collective of prize-winning photojournalists and filmmakers who are documenting programs that empower women and children in the developing world.

Known for her warmth and humor, Annie has a gift for sharing stories and photographs that humanize situations and cultures. Annie has received awards from the National Press Photographers Association, the Associated Press, the National Organization of Women, and the White House News Photographers Association.



Ruth Ben-Ghiat

Strongmen: Mussolini to the Present Friday, May 1, 7:00pm | Saturday, May 2, 2:00pm

Ruth Ben-Ghiat is Professor of History at New York University. She writes about fascism, authoritarianism, propaganda, and the threats these present to democracies around the world. Her most recent book, the New York Times bestseller Strongmen: Mussolini to the Present (2021), looks at how illiberal leaders use propaganda, corruption, violence, and machismo, and how they can be defeated. She is the recipient of Guggenheim, and Fulbright fellowships.

Ben-Ghiat's insights into the authoritarian playbook and democracy protection, and her ability to explain complex issues clearly and succinctly, have made her an expert source around the globe. She writes for *The New York Times*, *The Economist, The Washington Post*, and *The Atlantic*, and provides live commentary for CNN, France 24, MSNBC, and other networks. She has appeared in many documentaries about dictators and threats to democracy, such as Netflix's *How to Become a Tyrant* and PBS's *The Dictators' Playbook*. Ben-Ghiat served as a historical consultant for Guillermo del Toro's Oscarwinning *Pinocchio*, which is set in Fascist Italy, and the Netflix docuseries *Hitler and the Nazis: Evil on Trial*.




PAJAMA STORYTIME

FINDING MY VOICE IN A NEW COUNTRY

Life doesn't always go as planned. We can't choose what happens to us, but we can choose how to respond. I never thought I would live in another country. But when my son decided to study in the United States, I came with him to support him.

In China, life was comfortable. I had family and friends nearby, good food, fun gatherings, concerts, and help whenever I needed it. But after arriving in a new country, I felt like a baby learning to walk. Every step was difficult.

The biggest problem was language. I had studied English in school for many years. I memorized words, learned grammar, and got good grades. But after not using it for a long time, I found that I could not understand or speak well. At the airport, I suddenly felt deaf and mute. I could not read signs, order food, or talk to people. I became a stranger in this world. Even driving around and seeing American flags and unfamiliar people made me feel like I was watching a movie—not living real life.

At first, I had help from family and friends. I could stay behind them and ask for support. But as time passed, I knew I couldn't keep asking for help. Even my son, who always helped me, would sometimes say, "Mom, I have a test tomorrow. Please handle it yourself." So I had to face things on my own. I started using translation apps and ChatGPT. They helped a lot, but sometimes

the translations didn't make sense. I knew I had to really start learning English again.

Then one day, I found the Project Adult Literacy program at the Newport Beach Public Library. It was close to my home and easy to get to, so I signed up. With Christina's kind help, I started attending classes. I met two wonderful teachers, Marcia and Helene, who are patient and caring. I also met classmates from many countries who are working hard just like me. Soon, I will also have a tutor to help me one-on-one. This gives me hope and confidence that my English will improve.

Learning English is not just about speaking a new language. It also helps me make new friends, understand other cultures, and see the world in a new way. In class, some people share music from their home countries, others talk about their travels or traditions. It's exciting to learn so many new things.

Learning a new language is like opening a window to a bigger world. It helps me understand others—and myself—better. In the past, I was always told to make the "right" choices and try to be a "better" person. But now, I believe that sometimes we should just do what we enjoy. Maybe we don't need to be better. We just need to be more true to ourselves.

I'm thankful for this journey and for all the people I've met along the way.









STRATEGIC GIVING

As you make your end-of-year giving decisions, now is the time to consider strategic giving options to maximize your charitable impact and tax benefits. The Library Foundation makes giving flexible—we accept gifts of cash, securities, Donor Advised Funds (DAFs), and IRA Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs). WHY GIVE NOW? UNDERSTANDING THE 2026 TAX CHANGES

New charitable gift provisions from the "One, Big, Beautiful Bill" Act will go into effect January 1, 2026, potentially reducing the tax benefits of some future gifts. In 2026, there will be a new deduction floor. Itemizers will no longer be able to deduct the first 0.5% of their Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) contributed to a charity. There will also be a deduction value cap. Your itemized charitable deduction will be capped at 35 cents per dollar, regardless of your tax bracket. Due to these impending changes, accelerating your gift to the Foundation in 2025 may allow you to maximize your deduction under the current, more generous tax rates. Always consult your tax advisor or financial professional for guidance specific to your situation. There is one significant change for taxpayers that do not itemize in this bill. Starting in 2026, non-itemizers may still deduct up to \$1,000 (\$2,000 for those filing jointly) for charitable contributions.

DON'T FORGET YOUR MEMBER BENEFITS

Foundation members receive valuable benefits, including early access to program information, special event notifications, and access to recordings of Library Live and Witte Lectures, plus our Bookmark Magazine. Contributors of \$1,000 or more are welcomed into the Library Leadership Circle. This elite group is dedicated to keeping the Library a center of knowledge for future generations. You will enjoy exclusive event invitations and the satisfaction of furthering the Foundation's mission to fund valuable resources and programs for the Newport Beach Public Library. Program Underwriters (\$1,000 plus) also receive special benefits and recognition for the program that they underwrite. You can designate your gift to the Witte Lectures, Library Live, or Spotlight on Science.

DONOR ADVISED FUNDS

A Donor-Advised Fund (DAF) is like your own charitable savings account. You contribute to the fund as frequently as you like and then recommend grants to nonprofits like the Library Foundation, while potentially earning immediate tax benefits. If you are a client of Fidelity Charitable, DAF Giving 360 (Schwab Charitable), or BNY Mellon you can easily make a designation through the DAF Direct window on the Foundation website. If your DAF is with another charitable fund or trust, contact your financial advisor or trust administrator for details.

DIGITAL OR CRYPTOCURRENCY

The Library Foundation accepts contributions of digital or crypto currency through the nonprofit organization every.org. Every.org accepts the digital currency, issues IRS documentation to you, converts the currency to dollars and transmits it to the Foundation. You receive a tax deduction for the full price of the currency at the time of the gift through every.org.

RETIREMENT PLAN CONTRIBUTIONS – THE IRA CHARITABLE ROLLOVER

A special opportunity for those 70½ years old and older is the Qualified Charitable Distribution. You can give any amount (up to a maximum of \$100,000 per year) from your IRA directly to a qualified charity such as the Library Foundation without having to pay income taxes on the distribution. This popular gift option is commonly called the IRA charitable rollover, but you may also see it referred to as a qualified charitable distribution, or QCD for short.

STOCK TRANSFERS

The Foundation accepts shares of stock which are sold upon receipt and directed to the Annual Fund, Endowment Fund, the Beyond Books Campaign for Witte Hall, Project Adult Literacy or other programs in accordance with your designation. To donate shares of stock, the Foundation website has specific directions for your broker.

CREDIT CARD AND ACH

If you are contributing by credit card, the Foundation recommends you do so through the secure giving page on our website. You also have the option of contributing directly from your checking account through the ACH option on that page. There is also a downloadable form if you want to send your contribution through the mail, or you can use the return envelope enclosed in this Bookmark.

GIFTS OF REAL ESTATE

The Library Foundation has partnered with Realty Gift Fund to provide the option of gifts of real estate. Realty Gift Fund is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization that promotes the charitable giving of real estate by accepting real estate gifts, remediating assets for market, converting them to cash and using the net proceeds to make grants to non-profit organizations for current and planned gifts. You can also use a gift of real estate to fund a Donor Advised Fund or family foundation.

LEGACY GIVING

Legacy giving, often referred to as planned gifts such as bequests or charitable trusts, ensures the Library Foundation's financial stability and support for the Newport Beach Public Library for the long term. Planned giving allows you to leave a lasting legacy and can be particularly appealing to those who want to make a significant impact but may not have the means to do so during their lifetime. There are important tax advantages for donors making a planned gift, an option for those looking to manage their estates efficiently. The Foundation's Financial Literacy Workshops in the Spring, It's Your Estate, examines estate planning and the option of legacy giving. The Elizabeth and John Stahr Legacy Society was established to honor those who have notified the Foundation that it has been included in their estate planning.

As part of the Library Foundation's commitment to financial literacy, we are offering the FreeWill service to the community. FreeWill is an online tool to simplify the estate planning process. You can create a legally valid will or simple estate plan online at no cost, providing peace of mind and security for what you hold dear. We hope that you will include the Library Foundation in your legacy planning, but our goal is for Library patrons to create your estate plan whether you include the Library Foundation or not.

FOUNDATION CHAIR'S ANNUAL REPORT

Fiscal Year 2025 achieved many objectives of the Foundation as it continued to provide critical support for the Newport Beach Public Library. That support was not only for the six programs, 45 presentations, that the Library Foundation presented for the Library and its patrons, but the underwriting of the Beyond Books Campaign for Witte Hall, support for Project Adult Literacy, and direct contributions for library furniture, technology, eBranch databases, and funding for new collections when the new Balboa Library Branch is rebuilt. The Library Foundation, its donors, contributed \$403,940 to support its mission of "funding valuable library resources, programs and services, and engaging the community through the creation and sponsorship of diverse literary, cultural, and intellectual programs."

BEYOND BOOKS CAMPAIGN FOR WITTE HALL

The Beyond Books Campaign raised over \$2.8 million in contributions in the 2025 fiscal year ending June 30. As of that date, the Foundation had raised over \$11 million of its \$11.750 million commitment to the City of Newport Beach for the construction of Witte Hall, the Stahr Courtyard, and related infrastructure improvements. The Beyond Books Campaign will continue to raise awareness of the importance of Witte Hall for the Newport Beach greater community, and for the funds needed to not only meet its obligation to the City, but to also fund improvements to the original design, like the Foundation's decision to solely provide the additional funds to increase the size of the video wall to expand the uses for the Hall.

THE WITTE HALL CONSTRUCTION AND TOPPING OFF BEAM SIGNING

On Tuesday, November 12, 2024, at 2:00 p.m., major donors to Beyond Books, City Council members, City officials, and the Design Committee signed the steel beam that "topped off" the steel superstructure of Witte Hall. Construction is continuing and is scheduled to be completed in late Spring 2026. We eagerly await the opportunity to welcome the first audience into the Hall.

PROGRAM OFFERINGS

The 2024-2025 program season of the Foundation was amazing. The Witte Lecture Series and Library Live were sold out for every presentation with excellent speakers and audiences delighted with their expertise and insights. For the first time, the Foundation moved its Library Live series outdoors, turning the Civic Center Green into a vibrant, open-air lecture hall for an audience of over 500. The event, featuring Bonnie Garmus (author of Lessons in Chemistry), was a successful and memorable event.

The new free series, Spotlight on Science, informed full houses the impact of CRISPR technology, on hydrogen as an energy source, and understanding the risks of earthquakes in California. The other free community programs—Medicine in Our Backyard, Financial Literacy Workshops, and the Book Discussion Group—continue to increase audiences.

GOVERNANCE

The Library Foundation welcomed new Board members during the fiscal year ending June 30. Our new members are Andrew Gerken, M.D., a retired orthopedic surgeon, Dev Ghose, a former CFO of public companies, and Megan Gorman, Managing Partner of Chequers Financial Management and the author of *All the Presidents' Money*. Completing their Board service was Emily Menghin and Johanna Lee Kim. Also completing her Foundation service was Karen Heath Clark, former Library Trustee, Foundation Board member, and Foundation Chair who steered the Foundation through the disruption of the Covid pandemic and Library closing.

The Foundation also saw a transition in leadership in the fall of 2024. I assumed the responsibilities of the Chair with Kevin Barlow stepping back to be Vice Chair, Miles Yourman became Treasurer, and Mireya Llaurado took on the role of Secretary.

The Foundation Board of Directors is committed to the success of the Library Foundation and are strong advocates of the Newport Beach Public Library. Every Board member is active on a committee, stewarding programs, finances, and fund development.

PROGRAMS

The Library Foundation presented 47 programs in the 2024-2025 season, 35 of which were free for the community. Free programs included Medicine in Our Backyard, the Financial Literacy Workshops, Book Discussion Group, and the new initiative, Spotlight on Science. The total attendance for the programs presented by the Foundation was over 5,053.

In response to the high demand for Library Foundation programs and the Witte Season passes, we introduced season passes for our Library Live Author Series. We are delighted to report that 67% of our attendees held Library Live season passes. Given this success, we will continue to offer season passes for Witte Lectures and the Library Live Author Series.

WITTE DISTINGUISHED AUTHOR SERIES

The 28th season of the Witte Lectures kicked off with a SQLD-QUT event. featuring Bret Stephens, New York Times op-ed columnist and Pulitzer winner for commentary. Close to 1600 people attended the Winter-Spring 2025 Witte Lecture Series. Audience members were excited to attend compelling presentations by:

MEDICINE IN OUR BACKYARD

Through the Library Foundation's partnership with UCI Health and the support of Mike and Polly Smith, Medicine in Our Backyard engaged internationally renowned UCI medical faculty to address a broad range of health issues: cataract surgery, understanding osteoarthritis and its treatment, nutrition, managing cardiovascular disease, colon cancer, managing memory loss, treating melanoma and skin cancer. As many as 150 people registered for these free lectures, each ending with a wide-ranging Q & A exchange with the audience.

FINANCIAL LITERACY WORKSHOPS

The Financial Literacy Workshops started in September and continue to see an increase in participation. The workshops are free programs presented by the Library Foundation for the public. Financial Literacy presents It's Your Money Series in the Fall and It's Your Estate workshops in the Spring. Each series has six workshops.

BOOK DISCUSSION GROUP

This free program continues to see a significant increase in participation. Participants in the Discussion Group, moderated and led by Director of Programs Kunga Wangmo, suggest books to read and discuss, and then Kunga Wangmo curates the suggestions and includes the works by the Library Live authors who will speak on that series for the season. MEMBER EVENTS



At this event, the Foundation honored Karen H. Clark, Library Foundation's leader and visionary. After the reception, Michael Hiltzik, Los Angeles Times journalist and author of The Golden State: Making of California spoke about his new book followed by Q&A and book signing.

SPECIAL EVENT: WITTE HALL BEAM SIGNING

In November, the Library Foundation and the City of Newport Beach hosted the beam signing for the civic auditorium, the Witte Hall. It was attended by City council members, public works staff, Library staff, Library Trustees, Library Foundation board members, and generous donors of the Witte Hall.





The Library Foundation contributed \$403,940 to the Newport Beach Public Library for programs, direct grants to the Library, and capital campaign expenses for the construction of Witte Hall.

THE LIBRARY FOUNDATION'S PURPOSE

FINANCIAL OVERVIEW — As of June 30, 2025

For the fiscal year ending June 30, the Library Foundation contributed revenue exceeded budget by 21%, with total revenue, including earned revenue, exceeding budget by 17%. Strong control of expenses led to a net revenue of \$26,000. The Library Foundation contributed \$284,243 in programming for the Newport Beach Public Library and underwrote the costs of the Beyond Books Campaign for Witte Hall of \$50,032. It granted \$69,665 to the Library for its grant requests and special fundraising for services like Tech Toys for Kids. Overall, the Foundation provided support to the Library of over \$403,940.

The Foundation raised \$2.8 million for the Beyond Books Campaign for Witte Hall with additional confirmed gift agreements for a total of over \$11 million. The Foundation's endowment, restricted to support of the Library, was over \$3,800,000 as of June 30, 2025.

The Foundation has received a Platinum rating for transparency from Candid (Guidestar.org) and a Four Star rating from Charity Navigator. The Foundation has also met all PCI data security requirements for its giving portal and website by passing a SecurityMetrics® Vulnerability Assessment. These independent rating agencies assure donors, and the community, that contributions will be secure, stewarded, used for the intended purpose, and managed for the good of the Foundation, the Newport Beach Library, and the community that uses and enjoys the Library. The Foundation's audit and IRS Form 990 are on the Foundation's website under the About/Financial Responsibility tab.

DEVELOPMENT

In addition to the Beyond Books Campaign for Witte Hall and the annual fund for operations, the Foundation had special campaigns on Giving Tuesday and Library Giving Day for Library technology requests. Funds were raised for additional equipment in the Foundation-funded Sound Lab and for Tech Toys for Kids.

The Foundation's Legacy Campaign, the Elizabeth and John Stahr Legacy Society, encourages Library patrons and supporters to secure the future of the Foundation and its funding of Library programs and services through estate gifts or non-probate assets such as life insurance or retirement fund beneficiary designations. The legacy gift may be restricted to the endowment or to a specific program. The Foundation currently has over \$750,000 in primary or secondary beneficiary commitments.

As part of the Library Foundation's commitment to financial literacy, it is offering the FreeWill service to all Library patrons. FreeWill is an online tool to simplify the estate planning process. A legally valid will or simple estate plan can be created online at no cost, providing peace of mind and security. The hope is that the Library Foundation will be included in the legacy planning, but the goal is for everyone to create an estate plan whether the Library Foundation is included or not.
